We were pleased to acknowledge the accomplishments of those clubs who earned district awards and who proudly came to be recognized for their hard work in serving their communities and receive their awards.

As our clubs have been very busy with club picnics, service projects and fundraisers that benefit their communities, I was fortunate to attend the Leader Dogs for the Blind Summer Visit for first vice district governors in Michigan for the weekend. Leader Dogs for the Blind extended a warm welcome to all of us, providing good food and interesting speakers. To the past district governors, yes, we were served their famous chili and donuts lunch. The highlight was to tour the Leader Dogs facility where golden retrievers, black labs and German shepherds are housed for breeding and for training to become a prized leader dog. We met puppy raisers who also come to volunteer their time at the facility.

We had the chance to learn how it feels to be blind and to be led by a leader dog. We covered our eyes and took control of the dog's harness as we took a short walk, putting our trust in the dogs to bring us safely back to the starting point without hitting anything along the way. We listened to 3 leader dog recipients including Jeff Hawkins and his dog Gracie who came to our Leader Dog Banquets in 2017. They told how the blind and visually-impaired often live with depression after a loss of independence. Our club donations help to provide the leader dogs that lift these people out of depression to become active members once again in their communities.

In 2018-2019, the clubs in District 22W donated \$27,765.43 and ranked 11th out of 226 districts in the USA. 54 Lions Clubs were recognized for being Top Dog Clubs for their donation of \$5,000 in a Lions fiscal year. 2 clubs in our multiple district were recognized as Top Dog Clubs. MEMORIAL

LION JOHN WILLIAM "JACK" BELL, 82, longtime Walkersville farmer, died peacefully Tuesday, July 30, 2019 at Kline Hospice House. He was the loving husband of Carol Jean Bell, for 62 years. Born September 28, 1936 in Frederick, he was the son of the late William Wesley and Mary Ellen (Hahn) Bell.

Jack was raised in the Damascus area, where he and his brother, Don, began their early careers in farming. They farmed several different locations while attending high school. They would milk cows in the morning, go to school, attend sports practice, and return home for the evening milking. For many years, they assisted their mother at the Montgomery County Farm Women's Co-operative Market in Bethesda.

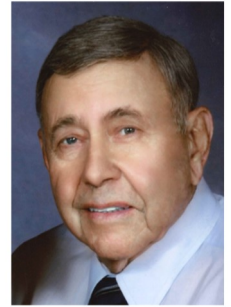
Upon graduating from Damascus High School in 1954, Jack enlisted into the U.S. Air Force, serving during the Korean War. He met his future wife, Carol Wheeler, on a blind date while attending a community dance in Spokane, WA, where he was stationed at the time. They married and returned to Maryland in 1958 with their infant son, Ronnie, upon John's Honorable Discharge from the service.

John and Don began farming in 1959 at the home farm of their uncle in Ceresville. Together, the Bell Brothers raised their families, milked 200 head of Holsteins, and crop farmed additional acreage in the Walkersville, Frederick and Thurmont areas. Upon dispersal of the dairy herd in 1996, John continued crop farming and raising beef cattle for several years until he retired full-time. Times spent with family were the most precious to him, whether it was going out to eat, attending his grandchildren's activities, or his favorite a daily car ride with his wife throughout the countryside of Frederick and the neighboring counties.

John was a very active member of the community. He was a 35-year member of the Glade Valley Lion's Club, receiving the Melvin Jones Fellow award for Dedicated Humanitarian Services. He thoroughly enjoyed being a Lion and served in various leadership positions within the club. His favorite activity was helping in the French fry stand each year at the Walkersville Carnival, of which his grandsons also helped in more recent years. He was a member of Columbia Lodge #58 and was a 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Mason. Additionally, John was a member of the Woodsboro American Legion Post 282, a former member of the Lewistown Ruritan Club, and a member of Brook Hill United Methodist Church. In earlier years, John was active in various farming organizations and served these groups in several leadership positions. He was a life member of the Frederick County Agricultural Society, Inc. and proudly served on the Board of Directors of the Great Frederick Fair for 30 years, retiring in 2012.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by four children, Ronnie Bell and wife, Dania, of Thurmont; Rhonda Starmer and husband, Steve, of Lewistown; Jacqui Kreh and husband, Richard, of Middletown; and Jody Bell and fiancée, Melanie Day, of Frederick; and 14 grandchildren and their families.

Funeral services were held. on Monday, August 5 from Brook Hill United Methodist Church,. Officiating were his pastors, the Rev. Dana Werts and Rev. Linda Warehime; and his longtime friend, the Rev. LCIF for 2019-2020

PDG Brian Cox and I would like to thank the Lions and Lions Clubs of 22 W for their support of Lions Clubs International Foundation for 2018-2019. 22 W Clubs and members generously donated over \$72,000 in support of "our" foundation. As usual, 22 W raised the most funds in our Multiple District.

Last year we had two clubs, Terra Rubra and Westminster, pledge to be "Model Clubs". In July Taneytown Lions pledged to become a Model Club when LCIF lowered the requirement from \$750 Per Member Average (PMA) to \$500 PMA. Clubs that were considering to becoming a "Model Club" last year and could not afford the \$750 PMA should use the new \$500 PMA to see if the new level will work for your club. This new level of \$500 PMA should make it easier for more clubs to become a "Model Club". Remember, the funds your club and members donated in 2017-2018 and 2018 -2019 count towards the \$500 PMA and your club has until June 30, 2022 to make the final payment.

A new program started by LCIF is the "Community Service Grant". When a club donates \$5,000 or more to the "Empowering Service Fund" they are eligible for a 15% Community Service Grant from LCIF that can be used for a project in your area. If the District donates \$10,000 or more, which is the total funds donated to the "Empowering Service Fund" by all clubs in the District (except for clubs that donated \$5,000). Funds donated the "Disaster Relief Fund" cannot be counted towards the Community Service grant allowance. LCIF will notify all clubs and Districts that qualify for the grant. Your clubs grant funds can be accumulated and held for 15 years.

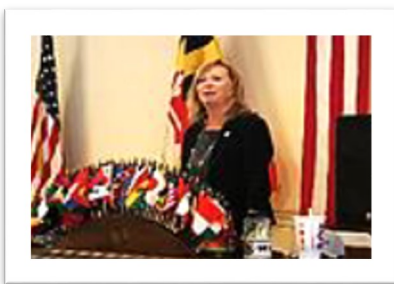
WASHINGTON COUNTY GRANT MANAGEMENT

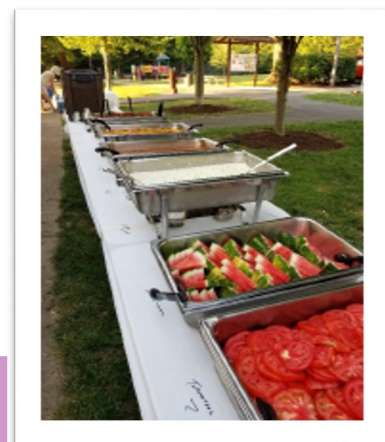
The corn was sweet, as well as the desserts. We are fortunate to have Mountain Gate catering our meals including this event.

The Kiss-A-Pig Contest for this Lions Year will be held at the third Cabinet Meeting which is to be held in Region III.

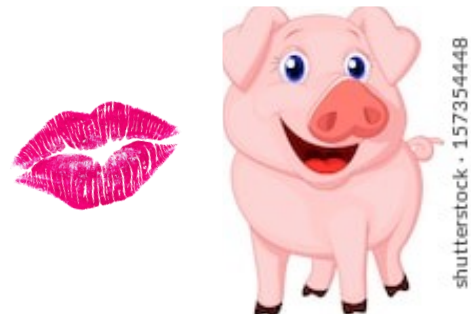

ALERT

Currently, Lion Myron Horn is the Chairman of the Lions ALERT Committee for both our club and for the district. He should be notified if a request for volunteers be made for a planned drill or following a disaster. He will coordinate with the Carroll County volunteer coordinator to ascertain where and how they want our response. This information will then be passed out using The Freedom District ALERT phonetree (Annex III.) The Club ALERT Chair will also be responsible for placing our local needs on the Lions Web site www.lionsclubs.org so that other districts may respond to our needs.

The fact that the club is involved in providing local humanitarian service may be communicated through our media liaison. Further, the club could work under a Lions banner or wear identifying attire to demonstrate to the community the "We Serve" motto.

The Communications Plan for our club's ALERT plan will largely utilize the telephone as the primary source between club members. The internet will be the backup to the telephone and can also be used to pass along large amounts of information and documents.

Lions District Governors in disaster-affected areas can apply for a LCIF Emergency Grant of up to \$10,000 for water, food, clothing, blankets, and medical supplies.

In a way of introduction, I am Lion Jack Niemec (pronounced, Nee-miss) of the Libertytown Unionville Lions Club. I was selected by Immediate Past District Governor Gerry Beachy to serve as one of three District 22W Trustees for the Lions Vision Research Foundation (LVRF). The other Trustees are PDG Susan Timmons, Administrative Manager of the Foundation, and Lion Paul Leatherman, Treasurer.

I have admired the work LVRF has accomplished since I became a Lion. The mutual beneficial relationship between the Wilmer Eye Institute at Johns Hopkins University and the Lions of Multiple District 22 is a model for success. The professional efforts of a world-renown university and the force of the MD 22 Lions Clubs have helped to mitigate the problems of low vision in an aging population in our communities. Lions, via LVRF, are not only servicing others, but also friends and family who need the low vision services. **The institute has 9 clinics in the MD 22 area, serving a projected six thousand low vision patients annually.** To serve this patient population Wilmer needs to continually train new doctors (MD's, OD's, and PhD's) in the field of low vision research. The lions help support this need by annually raising funds for a Post-Doctorate Fellowship at the Lions Low Vision Center at Wilmer. **The Lions Fellowship Program is like sowing seeds. Over the years these Fellows grow in stature and knowledge and train other professionals in low vision rehabilitation here and throughout the world.**

LVRF needs your help to continue this successful program. Donations to LVRF are recognized for individuals and clubs. The **"120 Club" Lapel Pin** is usually given for a donation of \$120 or more. A Recognition Program Brochure is available from a Trustee. For clubs that hold a Vision Day, a Trustee may present a Lions Vision Day Patch. Vision Day checks should be made payable to LVRF with the memo line reading-Lions Vision Days. A donation of \$1,000 is recognized by the presentation of the **"Knights of the Blind Pyramid."** The name of the honoree is engraved on the base of the pyramid. This award may be accrued over a five-year period. An Arnall Patz Fellowship will be awarded for a donation of \$2,500. which may also be accrued over 5-years. A LVRF Trustee will present a Fellowship Pin along with a commemorative wall plaque to the designated Fellow. Donations for these awards may also be budgeted by clubs, sent to the LVRF, and the award presented to individual club members in recognition of their service to Lions Vision initiatives.

In addition to Donations by individuals and clubs. LVRF holds, "Aim for Sight" Sporting Clay Shoots. This is a fun way to raise funds. Two Sporting Clay Shoots are being held this fall on Saturday September 28 at Mayberry Road in Westminster, MD, and on October 12th at Schrader's Outdoors in Henderson, MD. The speaker exhibited enthusiasm, commitment, and administrative skills that make the organization successful. Under her direction since 2007, it has grown from 500 to 3,000 clients.

Eligible families can get needed items once a month and if they visit four consecutive months, they are given vouchers to Walmart for 4 trips of \$40 each for qualified items.

Last year, Children in Need gave out \$758,000 worth of needed items, including donated bicycles that are repaired onsite by a volunteer.

Contributions of both goods and money are accepted. Shoes are the most needed item. Donation boxes are being placed at locations in the area. Funds are needed to purchase more boxes. For more information, go to:

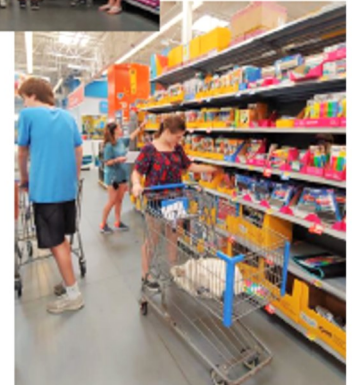


SCHOOL SHOPPING WITH THE LEOS:

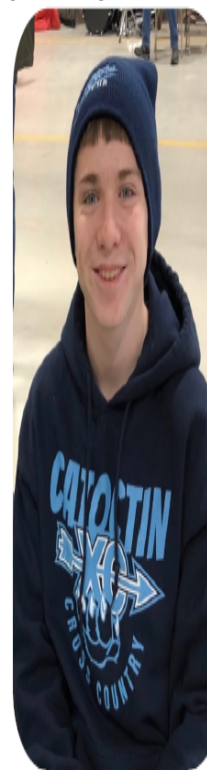
