The local Mission originally asked that we not drop off coats until November but when I apologized for doing so, the person in charge responded with delight that I did because the cold weather shelter operated by the Mission was not yet open and overnight temperatures were forecast to drop near freezing. That look of delight and the words of thanks were all that I needed to know that even a simple service project such as a coat drive can make a difference in someone's life. I am now looking forward to delivering the next batch of coats following my home club's next meeting. Service can begin with the simplest act.

Speaking of service projects I would like to share a "by-product" of one of my club's fundraising activities.

LET'S PROMOTE HEARING PRESERVATION, AWARENESS AND ACTION



Lewis "Ed" Crutchley, Jr. 76, passed away peacefully at his home on October 1, after a lengthy illness. He was the beloved husband of Grace Ellen Harrison Crutchley for 52 years. Ed graduated from Frederick High School in1962. He joined the Navy and served until 1966. He was a machinist mate 3rd class and had two deployments, to the Mediterranean service aboard the USS Robert L. Wilson DD847 and the USS Sierra AD18. After the service he worked for M.J.Grove Lime Co., Eastalco, Royal Electric Service, and most recently the Town of Myersville.



Ed was raised in Feagaville and Frederick and spent most of his married life in Middletown and Myersville. While growing up he helped his father with a general contracting business and raised show rabbits. Ed was active with his sons in Scouting Myersville serving as the Scout Master and den leader at the same time. He helped to establish the Scouting Explorer Post, sponsored by the Myersville Volunteer Fire company. Ed was a life member of the Independent Hose Company #1 since 1967 and was able to acquire a 1953 and 1973 Mack fire truck from the Independent Hose Company which he had been helping to restore. He is a life member of the Myersville Volunteer Fire Co. having served as Vice President and President. He was one of the first EMT's of the company. He was known for doing most of the food prep for major fundraisers by the company.

In addition to his wife he is survived by his two sons, Kyle Crutchley and wife LeAnn and Kenneth Crutchley and wife Christie, grandsons, Hunter, Tyler, and Mason and granddaughter Aiden. Ed was a member of the Myersville Lions Club and served as President and treasurer. He received the Melvin Jones Fellow Award in 2014 for his outstanding contributions to Lions Service. In 2014 he and Ellen were named Volunteer of the Year by the Myersville Parks and Recs Council of Myersville. Recently he been serving as Vice President of the Myersville Wolfsville Area Historical Society.

The family will receive friends at the Myersville Volunteer Fire Co., 301 S. Main St., Myersville, Md. On Wednesday, October 9th from 10:00am-12:00pm where a celebration of Ed's life journey will take place at 12:00pm. Rev. Tim May will officiate.

Topics for this year are as follows:

Elementary Grades: If I had ridden with Paul Revere...

Middle School: Why I'm Proud to be an American

High School: How did the American home front support the war effort during WWII?

Adult: It's 1917, the US has entered WWI and the first Lions Club has started. How did each

change the world?

Essay Program Rules for Participation Each Entry Must Comply with the Following

Each entry must comply with the following rules for participation:

- Use 8 ½" by 11" white paper
- Essay must be either typed or computer generated and double spaced. Handwritten copies will not be accepted.
- . Minimum of 300 words, maximum of 500 words
- Attach a separate cover sheet which includes the following information
 - entrant's name
 - entrant's home address including street, city, state and zip code
 - entrant's home phone number
 - name of school or "home schooled" (except for Adults)
 - name of sponsoring club



Essays in each category are to be judged by the sponsoring club. Winners should be recognized by your club once the essays have been judged at the club level and a suitable prize and certificate given to the winner.

Each club's winning essays in each category (elementary, middle, high and adult) are to be submitted to the zone chairman by February 7, 2020. The Zone Chair will evaluate the essays and submit one winning essay in each category to the Region Chair by February 21, 2020. The Region Chair will evaluate the essays, as submitted by their Zone Chairs, and will submit one essay in each category to the District Chair, Doug Favorite by February 28, 2020.

Winners at the district level will be requested to read their essays at the fourth cabinet meeting on April 4th, 2020. District winners will be presented with a U.S. flag and a \$100 cash award.

The district will cover the cost of the meal for all district winners. Please advise all district winners that their families (parents, grandparents, siblings, etc.) will have to pay for their own meals at the cabinet meeting.

SHERIFF JENKINS SPEAKS TO MIDDLETOWN LI-ONS\

On September 23, 2019, Sheriff Chuck Jenkins was the guest speaker at the Middletown Lions Club meeting. Sheriff Jenkins is in his 4th term as sheriff of Frederick County where he oversees and works with a wide variety of agencies and programs that include Homeland Security, Immigration, and School Safety.

Sheriff Jenkins brought data, the **Middletown Incident Report Comparison** that showed offences that occurred over the past 3 years. We currently have 3 deputies assigned in Middletown. Burglary is the number one crime in Middletown. Most assaults are domestic issues. Our crime rate is currently trending down compared to the past two years thanks to the hard work of the three deputies. He said it is a "Happy Valley" and things look good.

School security and safety is a primary responsibility of the Sheriff's department. He considers Middletown Schools some of the best protected schools in the county according to the ratio of police to students. We have 3 deputies assigned to do safety checks during the day. Every deputy in the county does school safety checks for the schools in their assigned areas. All schools have cameras. Deputies have a lot of input into each school's safety plan in the county.

The heroin/opioid crisis is worse than a crisis, more like a plaque according to Sheriff Jenkins. Fentanyl use has definitely increased. There has been a dramatic increase since 2012 and it peaked in 2016. There were 410 overdoses and 54 fatalities. The deputies started administering Narcan in 2013. The cost is \$34.00 a dose. This year the deputies have administered 133 doses to save lives. Jenkins feels the number of reported overdoses aren't decreasing because often victims given Narcan refuse treatment and the crisis does not show on the data reported. The deputies are finding more heroin laced with fentanyl today, and Sheriff Jenkins does not see an end to it. Eighty-eight percent of overdoses are young males between 18 -28. Middletown is no worse or better than any other community in the county. They have executed over 100 search warrants in the last year and they have not made a dent in the problem. Much of the supply of drugs are bought in Baltimore and brought to Frederick County. The first time it is a decision to use drugs and after that it's an addiction that the users will do anything to get the drugs. Deputies can't force users to go to the hospital or get treatment. Every school in Frederick County has Narcan on site.

Immigration enforcement is a big issue right now. As long as he is in this position Sheriff Jenkins will do everything he can to keep everyone safe and that includes partnering with ICE within the jail. They don't take people off the street or inquire about immigration unless a person is arrested. If it is determined that they are in the country illegally they are detained, and when released they are turned over to ICE and ultimately deported if ICE determines that it is appropriate. Over the past 11 years the Sheriff's department have filed 1600 detainers, 1350 of these people have been deported. Approximately five percent are here illegally.

Have you started to prepare a disaster kit for your home before extreme cold weather & snow sets in?

Here is a Disaster Kit Checklist from the Carroll County Emergency Management:

- Water one gallon of water per person per day
- Food: at least a three-day supply of nonperishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries
- · Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Manuel can opener for food
- Cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags & plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Whistle to signal for help

What you should know about diabetes:

- Over 360 million people worldwide have diabetes.
- The International Diabetes Foundation (IDF estimates that by 2030, over 550 million people in the world will have the disease.
- Every 8 seconds, someone dies from complications of diabetes.
- Diabetes is among the top 10 causes of disability.
- Children die of Type 1 diabetes in low- and middle-income countries because they lack access to life-saving insulin.

VIEWPOINT OF LOCAL INSURANCE COMPANY

Becky Gloyd, (pictured) Communication Director of Brethren Mutual Insurance Company gave an informative presentation at a recent club meeting. She gave an informative presentation on the history and evolvement of Brethren Mutual Insurance company which was founded and is headquartered in Hagerstown.



The firm was organized in 1897 when

it was formed by Brethren Church members. Company milestones through the year were covered by the speaker. She said that the insurance company is owned by its policyholders.

The company has 145 employees and operates in five states with additional expansion being explored. All of its products are marketed through independent insurance agents.

Brethren Mutual is also dedicated to involvement in the community, providing support for charitable organizations such as Habitat for Humanity and Children's Village. Last year, they were the top county fund raiser for cancer at \$22,000.

The program was arranged by lion Paul Needy who is IT manager for the company.

BIG BROTHERS BIG SISTERS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY

Tom Kline, (pictured) CEO of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Washington County spoke to the Hagerstown Lion about the organization

he has headed for the past seven years.

The local organization was formed in 1956 and is only one of two in the state of Maryland, the other being Baltimore. The national BBBS organization's history goes back to 1904 and now has affiliates in 12 counties.

The speaker cited the mission of BBBS as changing children's lives by matching them with caring adults to guide them on a path to success. The length of the mentoring period varies with the program selected.

Most clients are children from a single parent family with challenges. Matching a child with an adult mentor provides opportunity for the child's growth, awareness, and varied interests to bloom. There is a waiting list for children to be matched with mentors. More mentors are needed.

COUNTY LIONS PERFORM VISION SCREENINGS

Putting into action the organization's motto of "We Serve," nine Lions representing two Frederick County Lions Clubs recently came together on a countywide service project when 214 preschool children in the YMCA of Frederick County Head Start program received vision screenings performed by Lions members on eight different dates at various sites in September and October. The majority of the screenings were conducted at the Head Start offices in Frederick, with the remaining screenings held at Head Start locations at the Frederick YMCA and Hillcrest and Libertytown Elementary Schools. Approximately 137 Lions service hours were spent on this effort. This was the sixth consecutive year for the joint screening effort.

The children were brought in one at a time to a non-invasive testing station with Head Start staff members accompanying the children. The station utilized PlusoptiX S12C eye-vision technology to capture an image of the children's eyes and automatically determine whether a vision impairment, such as near- or far-sightedness or astigmatism, was present. The tester holds the unit approximately one meter from the child and asks the child to focus on the smiling face on the front of the camera. At the completion of the testing, each child received a Lion sticker to indicate they had completed the screening process.

While the vast majority of children passed, readings obtained by trained Lions indicated that some of the children needed to be seen by vision professionals for potential vision anomalies. The parents/guardians of 43 children tested received written test results to indicate that their child was recommended to see a vision professional for a potential problem or was unable to be screened. The advanced technology of the PluxoptiX camera provides readings that are printed out on a label which is attached to the letter for use by the vision professional of the parents' choice.

Colleen Ford, Health Coordinator for the YMCA of Frederick County Head Start, stated, "This school year, our local Lions Club members have dedicated many hours of their time helping Frederick County (Maryland) families and children by conducting vision screenings. They have participated in four days of vision screenings in September 2019 and four days in October 2019. This event is one of extreme importance to the child's overall health and educational development. With the state of art diagnostic machine they use, if the child is a referral, the information that is printed out for the family is of great importance to the provider performing the vision rescreen. Without the generous time given of the Lions Club members, it would be a hard mandate for Head Start to complete in a timely manner.

"The staff and families of the YMCA of Frederick County Head Start program greatly appreciate the time and dedication of all the Lions Club members that assist in this screening. It is always a pleasure to work side by side with my Lions Club friends! Keep on roaring and continue to be amazing every day!"


