

FIRST VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

March 8, 2020 was International Women's Day which celebrated the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. The day also marked a "call to action" to increase gender equality. July 4, 1987 was the date when women were able to become Lions. Special emphasis on recruiting women began with the Lions Women's Membership Initiative in 2003, which was kicked off with the Worldwide Women's Workshop. Women from all parts of the world gathered to discuss how Lions can



be more effective in recruiting women into clubs around the world and retaining them after they have become members. As of March 11th, our district reported approximately 140 female Lions which equates to 37% of our district membership. PID Ramaswamy, candidate for International 3rd VP, believes that there is a sense of empowerment in everything a woman does. He sees a clear efficiency in the way they work and tackle issues. Clubs in our district should make it a goal to increase their recruitment of female Lions in our district in the upcoming year.

The COVID-19 pandemic continues to affect all aspects of our lives. Our Lions Clubs are limited by the directives imposed by the State. Clubs are unable to meet, to conduct their on-going service projects and to conduct fundraisers to support their community service projects and finance our district activities. We have elderly Lions in our district and seniors in our communities who can use some emotional support and financial help to meet their health needs so show that Lion spirit and reach out to them. Clubs should be keeping in touch with their members through phone calls, emails and teleconferences to determine how their club can meet the needs of their community without violating the directives of the State. Staying in touch with club members will keep your club unified during this challenging time. Keep your eyes and ears open and make phone calls to your small local businesses, to the mom & pop-type businesses and the local food banks to see what you can do to help them. This may be the time to send more monetary donations if your club can afford it. Clubs with medical equipment should decide whether it is feasible to lend out equipment at this time which may jeopardize the lives of not only our Lions but also the public. Keep your spirits up and protect yourself and your family. Stay healthy indoors as directed by our governor so we will all be in better shape to serve our communities once again.

.Since many of our Lions events were cancelled in March and even more are being cancelled in April including our Leader Dog Banquets, please consider supporting the Leader Dog Program again this year by sending in your checks made payable to Lions District 22W Foundation to CT Ginny Fair. Our MD 22 Convention has been cancelled this year. The LCI International Convention will not be held in Singapore as previously scheduled due to the crisis. We are being advised that other locations are being considered. The USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum is still on schedule to take place from September 17-19 2020 in Louisville, Kentucky. However, the committee is monitoring the situation and hopes that the forum will go on as planned.

The deadline for submitting your club nomination for the District 22W Honor Roll Award is coming soon on April 15th. Please check the rules on pages 108-109 in the roster book and submit the nomination to me before that date.

Don't forget that it is also time to nominate your club officers for the 2020-2021 Lions fiscal year. The Club Officer's Report (PU-101) must be submitted online in MYLCI. question. You may want to conduct your elections by an alternate method such as mailing a paper ballot to your members or
you may want to consider on-line resources such as **Survey Monkey** to complete your club's election.

In early March, FVDG Barb Brimigion, SVDG Candidate Nadja Muchow, and I attended the District Governor Elect School held
in Cambridge. This was an extremely valuable training complete with the opportunity to exchange ideas and to network with our
counterparts within the multiple district. Thank you PDG Susan Bonura, MD22 GLT Coordinator, for facilitating the training.
Great job!

Finally, if you are sitting at home trying to find things to do, please **consider expanding your Lions knowledge** by taking online courses either through LCI or the USA/Canada Forum Lions University. The courses offered by both are extremely insightful and helpful for those considering advancing their Lions career either on the club level or the district level. We need new leadership on both levels. New leaders bring new ideas and new energy that we need to grow our clubs and our district. As a result of the COVID 19 pandemic, our world is changing dramatically and our existing ways of doing things may no longer exist, thus, we need forward thinking leadership to guide our future path.

It's not looking too bright for our neighbors around the world right now. Social distancing and self isolation lacktrianglerightare not things that Lions are known for, so many of us are feeling stymied. It's not in our nature to wait for the curve to flatten. We Serve. We want to help those in need. But how can we do that now?

There are ways. We just have to get a little creative and perhaps a little bold in the face of the coronavirus. Have you heard about the **blood shortage?** I understand that the Red Cross, for one, is taking extra precautions to pro-■ tect donors who venture to collection sites. Can you spare a pint?

■ How are your fellow club members bearing up? Your friends? Your neighbors? Have you spoken with them recently? You don't have to leave your home to call them, They might welcome hearing from someone who cares. You can still get close to them over the phone. Might even serve to improve your emotional state.

Perhaps you might talk to them about other actions you can take now to alleviate the apprehension that we're dealing with on what seems to be a continuing basis. Maybe plan on how you can prepare to step up when the situation begins to improve. What you can do when we return to our comfortable "normal".

Here's a thought I'd like you to consider. Something you can do right now to prepare for that day. Lions Low ■ Vision Rehabilitation Network - LOVRNET - .the program initiated right here in MD22 to address a problem faced by ■ 5.7 million people in the US alone. In our service area of Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia, there ■ are approximately 15,000 incidences of low vision annually and only 40% of those individuals receive service. That means that 60%, or 9,000 individuals, each year continue to deal with this problem without any help. And each succeeding year the number increases by 9,000!!

Imagine that curve. While perhaps not as dramatic as the incidence of coronavirus, it is devastating. You can do something to flatten that curve. **You** can do it now, without leaving your home. Today, go to www.lovrnet.org. You'll see a button that says "Become a volunteer". Click on that button and complete the application.

■ The application offers four programs for volunteers. The Administrative program entails management of the over-■ all LOVRNET project and deals with volunteer management, development, liaison with external organizations, edito-■ rial review for web site postings, etc. Community Outreach deals with the management and conduct of education-■ al programs at locations that may cater to individuals with low vision (senior centers, assisted living facilities) as well as identification and recruitment of new eye care providers. Direct Service volunteers serve mainly as resources to provide transportation of patients to doctor appointments but also may provide direct assistance to patients in their homes with instructions on operations of assistive equipment, basic organizational techniques, and safety inspections of residences. The Interviewer volunteers conduct the initial intake phone interviews for patients and follow up interviews.

■ After you submit the application, you'll receive guidance on training required (you do that online too). When you ■ complete the training, you'll get additional instructions on completion of a background check that is required for final ■ certification as a LOVRNET volunteer. Everything is accomplished online. No problems with social distancing. And ■ when you are certified, you'll be ready to step forward to help flatten that curve.

And there's one last thing you can do right now from your home. You can write a check to ensure that LOV-RNET succeeds in keeping that curve as low as possible. 

AN ALERT MINUTESubmitted by Lion Myron Horn

The training and the discussion that followed convinced me that most of us are woefully unprepared to respond to a major bleeding event. I'm not talking about putting a bandaid on your child's skinned knee. I'm talking about an event that if left untended would result in the individual's death. If you are squeamish in any way, this training would be difficult. Can you put your finger in the cut on someone's arm?

Beyond the training, many of us do not have the equipment necessary to properly do the job. Let us look at the typical drug store first aid kit that you stuff in your vehicle. You'll find a few gauze pads, some antiseptic wipes, and a box of band-aids. None of which would stop a major bleed. If you are the first person on the scene of a major accident, what would you expect to find... probably someone with a major bleed.

I recommend that all of you update every one of your first aid kits, but especially the one you carry in your car with two additional items. First, one of the combat medical tourniquets that you can get from Amazon for fifteen dollars. They are only about the size of your fist and are far more efficient than anything you could improvise. Second, add a couple of packs of clotting gauze, like QuikClot. These are designed to stop hemorrhaging by absorbing the blood which would incur clotting.



MARCH 26TH - DIABETES ALERT DAY

The annual American Diabetes Association Diabetes Alert Day ®, observed annually on the 4th Tuesday in March, is a one-day wake-up call to inform the American public about the seriousness of diabetes, particularly when diabetes is left undiagnosed or untreated.

They ask the American public to take the Type 2 Diabetes Risk Test online to find out if they are at risk for type 2 diabetes.

One in three Americans is at risk for developing type 2 diabetes, a serious disease that can lead to complications such as kidney disease, blindness, and amputations. But type 2 diabetes doesn't have to be permanent—it can be prevented or delayed with healthy lifestyle modifications.



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DISTRICT NEWS INFORMATION ON THE COVID-19 VIRUS PROVIDED BY PDG SUSAN BONURA

Call ahead before visiting your doctor. If you have a medical appointment, call the healthcare provider and tell them that you have or may have COVID-19. This will help the healthcare provider's office take steps to keep other people from getting infected or exposed.

Wear a facemask. You should wear a facemask when you are around other people (e.g., sharing a room or vehicle) or pets and before you enter a healthcare provider's office. If you are not able to wear a facemask (for example, because it causes trouble breathing), then people who live with you should not stay in the same room with you, or they should wear a facemask if they enter your room.

Cover your coughs and sneezes. Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw used tissues in a lined trash can; immediately wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60-95% alcohol covering all surfaces of your hands and rubbing them together until they feel dry. Soap and water should be used preferentially if hands are visibly dirty.

Avoid sharing personal household items. You should not share dishes, drinking glasses, cups, eating utensils, towels, or bedding with other people or pets in your home. After using these items, they should be washed thoroughly with soap and water.

Clean your hands often. Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol, covering all surfaces of your hands and rubbing them together until they feel dry. Soap and water should be used preferentially if hands are visibly dirty. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

Clean all "high-touch" surfaces every day. High touch surfaces include counters, tabletops, doorknobs, bathroom fixtures, toilets, phones, keyboards, tablets, and bedside tables. Also, clean any surfaces that may have blood, stool, or body fluids on them. Use a household cleaning spray or wipe, according to the label instructions. Labels contain instructions for safe and effective use of the cleaning product including precautions you should take when applying the product, such as wearing gloves and making sure you have good ventilation during use of the product.

Monitor your symptoms. Seek prompt medical attention if your illness is worsening (e.g., difficulty breathing). Before seeking care, call your healthcare provider and tell them that you have, or are being evaluated for, COVID-19. Put on a facemask before you enter the facility. These steps will help the healthcare provider's office to keep other people in the office or waiting room from getting infected or exposed.

Ask your healthcare provider to call the local or state health department. Persons who are placed under active monitoring or facilitated self-monitoring should follow instructions provided by their local health department or occupational health professionals, as appropriate.

If you have a medical emergency and need to call 911, notify the dispatch personnel that you have, or are being evaluated for COVID-19. If possible, put on a facemask before emergency medical services arrive.

Discontinuing home isolation. Patients with confirmed COVID-19 should remain under home isolation precautions until the risk of secondary transmission to others is thought to be low. The decision to discontinue home isolation precautions should be made on a case-by-case basis, in consultation with healthcare providers and state and local health departments.



My responsibility as District LCIF Coordinator is to ask you to contribute to our foundation. I know this is a difficult time for all of us, but the need to support LCIF now is critical. For consideration, applications need to:

- 1.Follow the Emergency grant criteria of having at least 100+ people infected (confirmed cases) in the immediate
- 2.US\$10,000 maximum grant amount.
- 3. Funds available only to address active and immediate cases; not future outbreaks. Disaster Preparedness grants are excluded.
- 4.Funds should be used for Lions to work with local medical and emergency management services that are addressing the outbreak. This could be for sourcing medical supplies, quarantine-related expenses, etc. for those infected.
- 5. Funds may not cover personal expenses for those infected or quarantined.
- 6. Another option is to consider Multiple District level grants, as appropriate, for areas with a significant number of cases (5,000+) over several districts.
- 7.All requests will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Please be aware acknowledgements and recognition for LCIF donations will be delayed due to COVID-19.

Good Afternoon Area A,

As many of you know, LCI & LCIF staff have begun working from home but are still here for all of your questions and needs. To keep you informed on how LCIF responded thus far to the COVID-19 crisis, our foundation responded, first in China, and now in Italy, with special designated disaster grants. LCIF awarded a US\$350,000 grant to support local medical and emergency management efforts in Italy due to the extreme scope and scale of the local situation.

LCIF is accepting emergency grant requests for the coronavirus on a case-by-case basis. The application must:

- 1) Have at least 100+ people infected (confirmed cases) in the immediate area/ district.
- 2) Keep to a **US\$10,000 maximum** request amount
- 3) Funds available only to address active and immediate cases; not future outbreaks.
- 4 Funds should be used for **Lions to work with local medical and emergency management services that are addressing the outbreak**. This could be for sourcing medical supplies, quarantine-related expenses, etc. (i.e. transportation, food) for those infected.
- 5 Funds **may not cover personal expenses** for those infected or quarantined (i.e. personal bills, medical insurance, lost wages, etc.).

I have included a copy of the emergency grant application in this email. You can send the application to lcifemergencygrants@lionsclubs.org. Please answer the four questions posed in the application. Especially important is what the Lions plan to purchase, how many people do they hope to target with the project, and how they are working with local medical and emergency services.

Judge Titus spoke on Bail saying this is dependent on whether the person is a flight risk and a risk to public safety.






