(Stull) Wolf of Frederick, MD and the late Donald Joseph Wolf.





STOP THE BLEED

Last month I attended a "stop the bleed" training session which was offered free by the Howard County Government. Although I have had many CPR/AED/First Aid Courses during my time as a Federal Police Officer, this was the first time I had training which concentrated on this life-saving technique. The course focused on applying tourniquets and "packing" a wound. These techniques could save more lives than CPR.

The training and the discussion that followed convinced me that most of us are woefully unprepared to respond to a major bleeding event. I'm not talking about putting a band-aid on your child's skinned knee. I'm talking about an event that if left untended would result in the individual's death. If you are squeamish in any way, this training would be difficult. Can you put your finger in the cut on someone's arm?

Beyond the training, many of us do not have the equipment necessary to properly do the job. Let us look at the typical drug store first aid kit that you stuff in your vehicle. You'll find a few gauze pads, some antiseptic wipes, and a box of band-aids. **None of which would stop a major bleed.** And if you are the first person on the scene of a major accident, what would you expect to find...probably someone with a major bleed.

I recommend that all of you update every one of your first aid kits, but especially the one you carry in your car with two additional items. First, one of the combat medical tourniquets that you can get from Amazon for fifteen dollars. They are only about the size of your fist and are far more efficient than anything you could improvise. Second, add a couple of packs of clotting gauze, like QuikClot. These are designed to stop hemorrhaging by absorbing the blood which would incur clotting.

NEW LIONS CLUB TO FORM IN FREDERICK



A new Lions Club is being formed in the Frederick

area. Founded in 1917, Lions is the world's largest volunteer organization. With 48,000 clubs, and 1.45 million members in over 200 countries around the world, the club's mission is simply to provide public service. Lions International works on core projects such as vision, diabetes, hunger, youth, cancer, and the environment.

"We are all volunteers here at Lions," said Lion Cartha Johnson. "We don't get paid and we volunteer. And, as we said, our motto is 'we serve' and so every cent that we raise from the public goes back into the public."

There are currently 14 Lions Clubs in Frederick County and three of them are in the Frederick area, but none of them focus on the unique needs of the immigrant community. Johnson says the international Lion President wants to focus on serving the more invisible communities.

"The immigrant community makes up nearly 15% of the population of Frederick County now and it just seems like this would be a good opportunity for us to help integrate the immigrant community into the greater Frederick area," said Lion Bob Johnson.

The Lions Club will hold an information meeting on March 9 at the Asian American Center of Frederick. The Asian American Center of Frederick opened its new location in October and refers to themselves as a community center for all. Executive director the AACF Elizabeth Chung says this new club is very valuable to the area.

"When they fist came to me, they talked about the underserved, the newcomers, immigrants so-to-speak and I think it's they understand, the underserved are looked down on and are hard to reach by a lot of the service providers. They felt that why not put their energies in helping the community, particularly the west side of Frederick," said Chung.

The Johnsons say they are excited to launch this great opportunity in the area

SERVING THE COMMUNITY

For over 130 years the **Robert Johnson Community Center** has served the residents surrounding Jonathan Street effectively and compassionately. Three Board members from that agency were presenters at the Club's January 28 meeting: **Carolyn Sterling** (Vice-President), **Alex Bolinger** (Program Director) and **Renee Burgan**. Each of them discussed one phase of the Center's operation.

Ms. Sterling reviewed the history of the Center from the North Street School for African American children (which is now a Head Start Center) to the present inclusive organization, named for former NHHS Coach Robert Johnson.

Ms. Burgan informed us of the Center's goals and needs – a directional sign on Jonathan Street, new flooring, a focus room, upstairs renovation, a van to transport children from outlying communities, a new website, and repair or replacement of the swimming pool which is presently closed be-



cause of serious maintenance issues.

Mr. Bolinger discussed the Center's varied programs – an eight week summer camp, after school program, book club, dance club, art club, even a STEM club. This summer he hopes to install a butterfly garden! After the program, Club members were excited and enthusiastic about the Center and its offerings. Many felt the Club can actively support some of its programs and contribute to its various needs. The presenters promised to return for a follow-up program.

Another community organization, the **Boys and Girls Club of Washington County**, was the feature attraction at the February 4 Club meeting. **Addie Nardi**, Executive Director, and **Craig Campbell**, Event Director shared the program. The Organization's mission "is to enable all young people, especially those who need us most, to reach their full potential as productive, caring and responsible citizens." With four centers in the Hagerstown area (largest at 805 Pennsylvania Avenue) BGCWC serves 225-250 children daily, 90% of whom are at or below the poverty level and 160 of whom are transported by van to the centers.

Programs are offered in tutoring, life skills, and interest groups such as art and dance. Homework help is also provided as well as recreational opportunities and free time to relax. Increasing revenue to accomplish and widen service opportunities is a high priority. Three major fundraising events this year will hopefully provide needed revenue.

The first is the annual **Steak and Burger Dinner** plus program on March 5 at the newly renovated Maryland Theater (tickets - \$60). The second is not for the faint of heart or those not fond of heights! **Over the Edge** on April 25 provides participants the opportunity to rappel from the roof of the Alexander House to the pavement far below. Amazingly a few Lions expressed interest in participating – or at least in trying to persuade a colleague, employee or spouse to participate! A more down-to-earth event, **a golf tournament**, will be held in the fall. Other goals include maintaining a consistent staff, a high quality activity score, and becoming the best community organization in the County (next to Hagerstown Lions Club of course!).

Essays in each category will be judged by the sponsoring club. The essay program rules for participation and compliance guidelines are as follows:

As president of the two-and-a-half years young UMD Bass Fishing Club for the past two years, she has grown the club to include 25 active members and three boats representing the state of Maryland this past summer as the first ever Marylander to compete in the Bassmaster College Series National Championship. While women have occasionally competed in the past on the national level, for 2019 amount 116 teams and 227 participants, Mullineaux was the only female competitor."

Bass Anglers Sportsman Society, of B.A.S.S. hosts the national championship each year, and they were thrilled to have Mullineaux, not only as a female representative of the bass fishing sport but as a Marylander and UMD participant.






