VDG SERVICE CHALLENGE BLANKET & PILLOW COLLECTION UPDATE

We are pleased to provide the final report of the first Vice District Governor "Kindness in Action" service challenge. Eighteen (18) clubs participated in the service challenge with a total of 537 blankets and 304 pillows donated to local homeless shelters and other agencies that provide housing to at risk folks. The Hampstead Lions Club led the way with 110 blankets and 45 pillows and received a check for \$100.00.

We want to thank the following clubs for their participation in the project:

"Kindness in Action"
Socks, Diapers & Baby Wipes for the Homeless

The agencies that provide services for the homeless in our five-county service district are in need of **new white socks, diapers and baby wipes** as they provide cold weather shelters for the upcoming winter season. For those shelters providing ongoing housing the need for socks and baby items is never ending. This is a great way to complete a simple act of kindness and instill a sense of service for our Lions members.

Lions can donate packages of new white socks and/or boxes/packages of diapers and baby wipes to our homeless shelters, get a signed receipt (page 2) for the number of items donated and submit the receipts to either FVDG Charlie or SVDG Nadja at or before the Third Cabinet Meeting on January 23. We have already contacted the various county agencies listed below and they are eager to accept what we donate. You may also use other facilities that will accept the requested items on behalf of the homeless. The club donating the most items will be recognized with a \$100.00 cash prize from the District.

Within our five counties there already exists a number of homeless and the number of persons seeking assistance is increasing each month. Winter is especially hard for those unable to secure shelter. The need is there – here is our opportunity to respond and serve.

MEMORIALS

LION, WERNER FITSCHEN, age 91, of Sykesville and formerly of New Windsor, died Thursday, October 22, 2020 at Copper Ridge. Born November 16, 1928 in Heeslingen, Germany, he was the son of the late Hinrich and Maria Steffens Fitschen. He was the loving and kind husband of Jean C. Fitschen, his wife of 65 years, father, and Opa to his grandchildren and great grandchildren.

At the age of 16 Werner was a member of the German Army during World War II, became a POW under the British Army, came to America in 1951 and was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1952, serving in the 101st Airborne. He later worked in military intelligence at Fort Meade and then served in the 24th Division in Korea. Werner was employed as an assistant plant manager at Koontz Creamery in Baltimore for 10 years, then with Mrs. Filberts as a manufacturing manager and later was in research and development with Unile-

ver Corporation, retiring in 1993. He was recalled until his final retirement in 1996. Werner was a member of St. Paul United Methodist Church, New Windsor, where he served on the Board of Trustees; the New Windsor Lions Club and their Board of Directors, overseeing the New Windsor Lions Town Park; the Town of New Windsor's Board of Zoning Appeals and served as a chief election judge. He was honored by the New Windsor Heritage Committee with induction into the Hall of Fame. Werner enjoyed hiking in the mountains, going to the beach with his family, woodworking and birdwatching.

In addition to his wife he is survived by children, Sharon K. Sanders and husband Jack T. of Ellicott City and Steven Werner Fitschen and wife Donna of Chesapeake, VA: 7 grandchildren, Andrea, Matthew and wife Alex, Daniel, and Beth Ann Fitschen; Lauren and husband Matt, Tracy and husband Kennon and Stephanie Sanders; 6 great grandchildren, Asher, Tessa, Titus, Charlie Kennon, James and Samantha, 2 brothers, Wilhelm Fitschen and wife Marlene of, Heeslingen Germany and Hermann Fitschen and wife Ingrid of Carmel, IN and sister-in-law, Anne Fitschen of Heeslingen. He was predeceased by a grandson, Michael; sister, Elfriede Budde and husband Wilfried and brother. Gerhard Fitschen.



LION DAVID GRANT CLARK of Homewood at Crumland Farms, Frederick, passed away suddenly on Friday, December 11, 2020. A loving husband, father, grandfather and a friend to many, Dave was born November 7, 1933, in Hartford, Connecticut to the late Kenneth Grant and Dorothy Bidwell Clark. He was educated in the East Hartford school system where he was active in athletics and music.

Dave attended Trinity College (Hartford) where he played football and was a member of Alpha Chi Rho fraternity. He left after sophomore year to enlist in the Army, becoming a communications specialist and completing his tour of duty in Korea. Following his Army service, Dave returned to school, matriculating at Springfield College where he played football and graduated as a member of the class of 1958. He then received a Master's in Education from the University of Rochester.



Dave was a founding member of the Middletown Valley Athletic Association where he helped start the football program and coached midget football; he was also instrumental in raising money to start the football program at Middletown High School. He was a member and former President of the Middletown Lion's Club; member and former President of the Rotary Club of Frederick; and member and former President of the Frederick Cotillion. Dave was a member of the Economic Community and Development Commission; a member of the Frederick City Recreation Commission; served on the Frederick Area Committee on Transportation - Chair of Local Roads Committee; and was a member of the Board of the Maryland Sheriff's Youth Ranch. He also was an active volunteer with Meals on Wheels. He liked being known as someone who "got it done" and proudly did so in Frederick County for over 50 years. A long-time member of Christ Reformed Church, Middletown, Dave was a member of the Senior Choir and, over the years, served as Elder, Deacon and Chairman of the Consistory, among many other positions.

Dave loved his family and friends; always enjoyed a good laugh, a bad joke, just about any sporting event and his children's and grandchildren's sports, events and shows; and especially enjoyed being on a beach or the water. He remembered birthdays (calling to sing happy birthday in his beautiful voice); kept up with many friends; and was mentally and physically strong to the end. He was the kind of person who made everyone around him happier and will be missed by all.



From DG Brimigion and FVDG Croft - Governor Hogan and state health officials have issued a public health advisory on Tuesday, November 10th which strongly discourages indoor gatherings of more than 25 people. This would apply to indoor Lion events, including club meetings, charter nights, Lion holiday gatherings, region-wide meetings, zone meetings, service projects and fundraisers. This may also affect our next cabinet meeting in January. The district strongly advises that the clubs in our district follow this recommendation. If your indoor meetings, including the upcoming region-wide and zone meetings typically have more than 25 attendees, either change the format to a virtual meeting (Zoom) or teleconference or limit the attendance to a maximum of 25. This also includes any in-person DG Official Visit. We are able to conduct our DG Official Visits by Zoom.

For those clubs with a free Zoom account with limited minutes, DG Barb can also host the Zoom meeting since she has a paid Zoom account with unlimited minutes. Please refer to the news for further information on the restrictions. Your safety is our primary concern.

SCAM WARNINGS

Family/Friend Imposter Scams

Fraudsters call you pretending to be a family member, often a grandchild, and

claim to be in urgent need of money to cover an emergency.

Warning Signs:

- A grandchild is in trouble and needs money immediately.
- They don't want their parents to be contacted because it would get them in trouble.
- Payments are requested by wire transfer, prepaid debit card or gift card.

Tech Support Scams

Scammers use pop-up messages, fake websites, or phone calls to trick you into thinking your computer has a serious problem. They obtain your money by having you pay for fake technical support, or steal your personal/financial information by gaining access to your computer.

Warning Signs:

- You are asked to pay for tech support or other services with a gift card, cash-reload card or wire transfer.
- The message contains bad grammar or misspelled words.
- Someone calls or emails you claiming to work for a brand-name tech company such as Microsoft or Apple.

Social Security Impersonation Scams

Scammers impersonate Social Security Administration employees to obtain your money or personal/financial information.

Warning Signs:

- The caller threatens to suspend your Social Security benefits.
- The caller trys to charge you for services the Social Security Administration provides for free.

AFFECTING OLDER ADULTS

Robocalls

Hackers change their caller ID to a number other than the one they are calling from and pose as representatives from your bank, credit card company or a government agency to obtain your personal information.

Warning Signs:

- The message says you owe money and face legal or financial consequences if you don't pay right away.
- A prerecorded message tells you to press "1" or some other key to be taken off a call list.

Romance Scams

Scammers create fake profiles on dating sites and social media, often using stolen photos, to obtain your money or personal/financial information.

Warning Signs:

- They ask you to start communicating by text or personal email, away from the original site you met on.
- After gaining your trust, they start telling you stories of bad luck or medical emergencies.
- They ask for money, gift cards, or funds to pay off credit cards. CybercrimeSupport.org | FraudSupport.org

Normally at this time of year we would be spreading cheer and checks to several organizations with a contribution check and a photo op. As we are not doing that , several organizations have reached out to say "Thank You" to our club for what we have done. Since July our club has provided purchase of exams and eyeglasses for 14 individuals. Last year (July 2019 – June 2020) we provided for a total of 20 individuals. Our only provider of services in this area has been Dr. Jones (Associate Lion Member of our Club - from Regional Eye Center) since Dr. Wolf has retired and closed his business.

Lion Ryan Wolf, his wife Ginger and his son (Honorary Lion) Mason worked on getting our club's display as well as other Christmas lighting displays for Southern High School activities and other businesses/organizations, set up in Broadford Park. The monetary donation of \$10 per car load will help tremendously. The display will be available until the beginning of January by entering through the Little League gate on Broadford Road. Come out and view as it is another way of our Lions giving since we missed the fall sports season.

Regina Gearhart with Garrett County Community Action Aging and Nutrition Staff sent a card and letters for the Meals on Wheels program. Our donations of food items and that due to the pandemic they have served 2 additional meals per week so the vulnerable could remain at home. This has worked out to serving more than 20,000 more meals this year than 2019. This s providing meals for 299 individuals of which 282 at nutritional risk. Meaning that they did not have the financial ability to purchase adequate food at less than two meals a day and ha dlost 10 pounds in the last six months. Of those 280 are of the highest priority as they are unable to cook and hav eno assistance with this task. We are also thankful for their Annual Autumn Glory Turkey Dinner Fundraiser for Meals on Wheels Program with our donation of 16 cases (6 cans per case of #10 can) of vegetables and fruits helping to make this their largest Autumn Glory Fundraiser to date.

Remember, it is not **ONE** Lion that has made a difference this year for these organizations but the WHOLE PRIDE OF LIONS that make up our club!

Lions Need to Feel Valued

Every Lion wants to be valued by their Lion family. We want you to track members who miss meetings, service projects, fundraisers, or who are ill or injured. We want them to know the club is concerned about their welfare by sending them a card, an email or calling them.

Our goal is to create a step-by-step standardized process that any club can follow. We are asking clubs that do not have a process for tracking and responding to the welfare of their members to appoint a Member Satisfaction Committee to keep track of members and help them feel like they are an important and valued part of the club. The one or more members of the Membership Satisfaction Committee should be appointed by the President during December and begin tracking in January 2021. Each President is asked to inform the District that they have appointed the committee. Clubs with a process may want to incorporate elements of this process into their existing program.

- 1. The Club President shall appoint one or more members to a Membership Satisfaction Committee during December and begin tracking in January 2021. Club members will have the opportunity at the beginning of each Lions year to volunteer to Chair the Membership Satisfaction Committee. This position is necessary in order to follow-up with club members to ensure their welfare.
- 2. The Membership Satisfaction Committee Chair may recruit other club members to the Membership Satisfaction Committee.
- 3. The Club President informs the District that a Membership Satisfaction Committee has been created by emailing md22membership@gmail.com by January 2021.
- 4. The Membership Satisfaction Committee looks after the wellness of our members. The Membership Satisfaction Committee Chair may delegate duties to the Secretary, Newsletter Editor, or other committee members. The committee uses the information received to let members feel important and that they are a

valued part of the club.

- a. The Secretary or club greeter will keep track of members, taking attendance, receiving notification of illness, and communicating with club members.
- b. A member of the committee is assigned to contact the member who has an

unexpected lack of attendance at a meeting, service project, or fundraiser or notice of illness or other issues to let them know they were missed and offer the club's moral support. Some clubs will be able to do this with phone calls, emails, or visits.

- c. While the Secretary will keep track of those members that miss a number of meetings, a member of the committee is assigned to contact them to find out their status and to inform the President if there is an issue that needs to be addressed.
- d. The committee informs the club Secretary and President of ill or deceased members or their family members and sends the appropriate correspondence to those ill members or the families of the deceased members. For illness or deaths some clubs will send flowers President of ill or deceased members or their family members and sends the appropriate correspondence to those ill members or the families of the deceased members. For illness or deaths some clubs will send flowers or a fruit basket, some will send emails or a card.

The club Secretary or an assigned committee member keeps club members informed of the welfare of members via their email distribution list, telephone tree and club newsletter.

The club can create a line item in their administrative budget for the Membership Satisfaction Committee expenses or a fruit basket, some will send emails or a card.

The Homelessness committee, chaired by Leo Willow, organized a stocking stuffer drive from Monday, November 23rd through Friday, November 27th. Items such as toothpaste and toothbrushes, shampoo and conditioner, tissues, baby food, and baby wipes were to be dropped off in a designated bin at the entrance of Walkersville Highschool.

After approaching the Glade Valley Lions Club, Leo Claire and Lion Jennifer sent a \$100 donation and "thank you" card to the Van Bloem family on behalf of the Walkersville Leo Club.

In addition, the Club created an official Twitter account (LeoClubWHS) and reviewed, altered, and verified the Club's constitution and bylaws. Leos have begun brainstorming future holiday plans, such as organizing a bake sale, which Leos Leah, Lea, and Martina will spearhead. The Club will carol in Downtown Frederick, though a date has not yet been finalized. The next general membership meeting will be held virtually on December 11.
