## **DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE**March 2021 District Newsletter

International **Women's Day** is observed annually on **March 8**, all around the World. It is a day to reflect on and celebrate the accomplishments of women. Although it is a holiday in some countries, it is a normal day in the United States as businesses and schools are open. On a Google Search, I found that there are approximately 166,238,618 or 166.24 million women in the US, slightly more than males at 162.83 million men.



Women had been barred from LCI since its formation by a Chicago business group in 1917. I read that officials said that women were kept out because so few were in business when the organization began. Women were first approved for Lions membership in July 1987 when they were granted the right to vote and to hold office. **LCI was reported to be the first service club organization to admit women.** In our Multiple District, there are approximately 2101 female Lions and 3947 males. Our district has the most women in the Multiple District with approximately 634 females while we have 1,099 males. In District 22W, we have 53 clubs out of 55 total Lions Clubs who have at least one female Lion. Our district has 60% females who are either officers or committee chairs/co-chairs while 41% of the officers and committee chairs are females in the Multiple District.

Since 1987, our district has had only 6 female district governors. PDG Carol Smith was our first district governor and PDG Barb McKenney, PCC Clare Newcomer, PDG Susan Timmons, PDG Susan Bonura and I have followed. The first female International President of LCI was Gudrun Bjorn Yngvadottir from Iceland who was elected in 2018. She said, "People are starting to realize that we're an organization of both men and women. Hopefully, more women are ready to join. We aim to have equal membership between men and women because now (2018-2019) there are about 400,000 women and one million men." We are due to have our second female International President, Dr. Pattie Hill, in 2023-2024.

Our current International President Dr. Choi, encourages us to serve through diversity, having a mix of young and mature members, men and women, and people of different races and nationalities. It brings unique experiences and skills to our clubs. He encourages the districts to reach out to those clubs who are not diversified and encourage them to consider making the change.

In the business world, they say that women are usually curious, creative, and they ask questions that lead to comprehension. They usually take the initiative, build relationships in a group, communicate better and are often more innovative. I have spoken with some male Lion officers in our district who say that it is the women in their club who make their service projects and fundraisers organized and successful. There are many female Lions in our district who are the committee chairs in their clubs. *They get the job done l've been told.* 

Clubs that don't encourage women to join them are missing out on the talents and abilities of women. Having both women and men in your clubs means you benefit from the different points of view and approaches that come from different life experiences. Clubs should motivate their male members to ask their spouses to join. Female Lions should be challenged to ask their girlfriends, female colleagues, female relatives and neighbors to join and to increase the number of female Lions in their club. Challenging each other and collaborating with people who think differently can breed creativity, leadership, and promote the innovative ideas that will push our district and organization forward. Lion Vicki Mahr, our District 22W Family and Women's Specialist, is available to give speeches to clubs, even on Zoom.

#### **Taking Time to Listen**

■ It's easy to assume we know what's best for others and to simply give them that material thing.
 ■ But, if we seek to serve others well, the best thing we can do is take the time to get to know
 ■ people and honor them with a listening ear. If we skip this step, we make it a lot more about the
 ■ good feeling we get from helping than we do about actually serving someone else.

#### ■ I believe the simple act of listening is a powerful way to serve.

If we show up to paint a house, build a wheelchair ramp, or put up new drywall after a hurricane, but don't take the time to look into the homeowner's eyes or learn her name, what impact have we really made? There is so much power in <a href="mailto:being intentional with the way we build relationships">being intentional with the way we build relationships</a>. In my experience, while the project is important, sometimes sitting down with someone, sharing coffee, and listening to her story does a lot more than a fresh coat of paint.

When we listen to others, their needs might surprise us. By simply making the statement, "Let me know how I can help," we're opening ourselves up to a world of needs, not just the ones that are convenient or fit nicely into the time we've allotted to help. This often requires us to drop our own agendas, and it may cause us to serve in ways that stretch us beyond simply where we see ourselves "gifted."

But the act of caring might not always require big, dramatic action. Caring for another person might mean going against what's on the planned agenda or going back to the store for a specific shade of paint a homeowner has her heart set on. It might mean grabbing the rubber gloves and cleaning out moldy cupboards, or letting the mess be for now and sharing a cup of coffee. Caring for someone might mean spotting them a dollar for a slice of pizza, or dropping everything and sharing a conversation on the sidewalk in the middle of New York City.

**LION HAROLD "CORKY" ZEIGLER** received a Melvin Jones Fellowship from the Middletown Lions Club and has been named Lion of the Year. He has been the backbone of the Club since joining in 1957. At 101 years of age he is the quintessential "go-to man". If there is a plumbing or an electrical problem with the Lions ice cream trailer, if we need to know who to contact for this or that, or if we have any problem, Corky is the man! There is no job too large or too small. He is credited by long time members of the Club as saving the club when, years ago, membership had dropped. He guides the Club in all areas and he is always there to help in any capacity putting in many hours for his club and community.



He was a life member of the Amvets (he served in Europe during WWII), the Middletown Volunteer Fire Company, and Christ Reformed Church. But foremost he is known in each of these organizations as a Lion.

Corky has many stories that he loved to share about his 64 years as a Lion. One story in particular was when he worked alone one snowy day in December selling Christmas trees. Two small children appeared bright eyed asking for a tree. The mother said they couldn't afford one. The kids kept looking at the trees and began crying. Corky called the mom back and let the kids choose a tree. Cork said, "This is your tree," taking the money out of his own pocket to pay for it. He then drove the family home because they had no transportation. Seeing how poor the family was he made certain they had food and gifts for the children for Christmas.

An activity of the Lions Club was to give away turkeys at Christmas to needy families. He remembers one Christmas Eve driving down a drifting country lane. At the house the only light was a dim one through the door. They knocked at the door three times and got no answer. Finally the door opened and a little two-year old child said his mother was ill. Entering the house they, Corky and the Lion with him, found that she had been in bed for six weeks. They took food and toys to the family and Corky called Dr. J. Elmer Harp (who himself is a Middletown legend) and took him to see the mother. Corky believed a Lion's duty is to serve his fellow man.

His many years of service to the community and the Lions Club are great examples to us all. We will all miss Corky, his collection of stories, and we will struggle to find the words to thank him for his many contributions through the years.

### START A MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN SOURCE: LCI

Our district is still at a net loss. I thank the clubs that have brought in new members, but we all have to work a little harder to bring in new members and lessen the net loss. The following information was included in an article that was sent by the International President. Please consider these ideas by talking with your club members. DG Barb

<u>The Just Ask! New Member Recruiting Guide</u>, found at www.lionsclubs.org/ MembershipChair is a great place to look for ideas to help ensure your membership campaign is successful. Following are some membership recruitment techniques used by clubs worldwide in conjunction with the best practices referenced in the Just Ask! Guide:

The Challenge: Add an element of fun by challenging other Lions or clubs to recruit new members. Each Lion or club simply challenges the other to meet or exceed the number of new inductees. The "loser" is committed to do something for the "winner" of the challenge, such as host a reception or assist with a project. Prizes can be creative or unusual. Announce the challenges throughout the district by ways of newsletters, announcements, visitations and other meetings. Be thoughtful in planning your challenges. Challenges between club members and also other clubs in the district should not overshadow the importance of adding a quality member to a club.

**Recruitment Night:** Ask each member to invite a potential member to a special club meeting, including a Zoom Meeting. This meeting should feature projects and accomplishments of the club—and let the guests get to know the other members.

**Project Volunteers:** Invite the public to participate in a special club project such as a pop-up pantry or park maintenance project. The public will learn more about the club, and club members will learn more about the volunteers and can invite potential members to a meeting, including a Zoom meeting.

**Member-Get-A-Member Campaign**: Each member is encouraged to provide the names of potential members to the club's membership committee. Possible new members can include colleagues, relatives, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders, corporate leaders, educators, other professionals and friends. If your club is involved with youth activities, you may find parents, youth leaders and other adults interested in community service. The committee can follow up for possible recruitment.

**Club Advertising and Promotion Campaign:** Some ideas for reaching out to members in the community using advertising and public relations techniques include:

- Setting up a booth at a community event when you are able can be done at pop-up pantries.
- · Publicizing your activities in a local newspaper
- · Conducting a direct mail campaign
- Designing a Web site for your club and its activities if you don't already have one. Keep it up-to-date.
- Hand out club brochures at your fundraisers or on community bulletin boards.

When I signed up for my second term as President of the Freedom District Lions Club, I had no idea about the changes I would see. You see, six years ago, during my first term, things were "normal". We were meeting twice a month with dinner and a program. We were visiting other clubs. I attended the Change of Banner Ceremony, the Melvin Jones Award Banquet, the Sight Conservation Banquet, the District Social, and the Leader Dog Banquet. We had a rousing Multi-District Convention in Dover, DE and a wonderful USA/Canada Forum in Grand Rapids, MI.

We fund-raised with Carnival Fries, Onions, and Citrus Fruit. We had a Veterans Support Dinner with forty veterans and guests, fed the hungry with 10,000 meals, and screened the vision of nearly four-hundred preschoolers. Things were going well for the club. We even brought in sixteen members at one induction ceremony. And now, thanks to COVID, how things have changed. We are doing one virtual meeting a month. We have not had a dinner meeting, banquet, or social of any kind for over a year.

We have not had much of a chance to work with our wonderful LEOs. We lost our carnival fries and onion fundraisers. We haven't been able to screen our children for vision problems.

Some Lions clubs are on the edge of closure because they have not met at all and have lost all of their fundraisers. Even our language has changed. We've added words like COVID, Pandemic, and Zoom to our common vocabulary. Being a technophobe, I never dreamed that I would be running a virtual Board of Directors Meeting. I'm getting so comfortable with Zoom, I expect we will do it that way for the foreseeable future. (It sure beats cramming fourteen people in that small room at Messiah Church.)

**Things are not all for the worse.** Our club has responded with some fantastic COVID projects. Early in the pandemic, we manufactured 1200 face shields and delivered them to Carroll County Senior Assisted Living Centers.

We then took on the awesome Pop-Up Pantry Project. For twenty-one weeks, we placed groceries, canned goods, milk, bread, and fresh vegetables into the trunks of forty families a week. **Nobody was turned away**. Now, Lion Scott is leading the "**Hero Project**" to thank those on the frontlines at Carroll County Hospital.

Twinning is back again at FDLC: Lion Surani Peiris had arranged for several FDLC members to hold a zoom meeting with Lion Roshan Latiff, club president of the Battaramulla Inner Circle Lions Club in Sri Lanka, on February 18th to discuss the possibilities of our clubs forming a twining relationship with each other.

Lion Surani and Lion Roshan were Leos together several years ago. Their club is unique because they sponsor three LEO Clubs in Sri Lanka. One is a high school LEO club like ours and two are Alpha -LEO Clubs (young adults). We hope that this twinning will be beneficial to both clubs.

Our clubs will be exchanging newsletters, starting with the March club newsletter. The Sri Lanka club was chartered in 2006 and its' location is near the southern coast of its country near the town of Columbia. While its membership is low at 7, about 15 additional members will be coming to join from the Leo clubs. The 3 Leo clubs have large memberships from which they draw memberships into the Lions club.

Both Leos and Lions have been active in the Covid 19 process by providing PPE to the community in which they serve. Twinning illustrates the third purpose of the association: to create and foster a spirit of understanding among the people of the world. It fosters international cooperation and usually involves the exchange of club newsletters and other correspondence regarding projects, etc., and sometimes visits by members.


We have raised almost all the money needed to sponsor a leader dog. We will continue to work on this project with the help of local businesses.

#### **MEDICAL EQUIPMENT LENDING PROGRAM**

In January, the MELP received donations of 41 items from 3 entities. Most of those came from a company in Montgomery County that assists people with downsizing. In addition to medical equipment, they donated several boxes of medical items-disposable briefs, dressing and wound care supplies as well as 9 boxes of Vol. 61, No. 8, February 2021 3 brand-new accessories for CPAP machines--i.e. masks, tubing, water wells.

I am in the process of contacting the offices of local pulmonologists to see if they know of patients who could use the equipment. These items are incredibly expensive when purchased outright; insurance companies only pay for these items periodically, so I hope I can find a way to donate them. The disposable briefs and other items were donated to the Food Bank. We have loaned 18 pieces of equipment to 11 different people. Additionally, we assisted with picking up and delivering a donated electric scooter to a man in Thurmont. Laura Berman, a social worker at FHH, helped with this transaction. We also received a donation of hearing aids which had been purchased from CostCo per the donor. We were able to donate them to a client who had them refitted at CostCo free of charge. What a nice service!





#### "FEED THE HUNGRY" - FOOD COLLECTIONS

#### THE LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL CODE OF ETHICS:

Doing What's Right Melvin Jones was a successful businessman in Chicago in the early 20th Century. In 1917, he gathered together other successful businessmen like himself to form an organization dedicated to using their resources to help those with less. This, of course, was the birth of Lions.

From the start, these Lions were moved by a true desire to assist those in need. At the same time, they also understood that some members of the public might wrongly assume that the new organization was a front, a ploy to generate more wealth for Club members. Those early Lions knew that nothing would bring about a failure of their new endeavor more quickly than suspicion of their motives. They needed transparency - a clear statement of their purpose that the public could readily grasp. Thus they created the Lions' motto, "We Serve." Then, to ensure that no member would sully the hardearned reputation of Lions, they also created a standard of conduct by which all members would be expected to abide: the Lions Code of Ethics. The Lions Code of Ethics is not long – a mere 8 points. Taken as a whole, these points can be summarized more simply as: "Work hard, be fair, be generous, be true." Let's take a look at the first few of the Code's points. • To Show my faith in the worthiness of my vocation by industrious application to the end that I may merit a reputation for quality of service. • To Seek success and to demand all fair remuneration or profit as my just due, but to accept no profit or success at the price of my own self-respect lost because of unfair advantage taken or because of questionable acts on my part. • To Remember that in building up my business it is not necessary to tear down another's; to be loyal to my clients or customers and true to myself. "Wait a minute," I hear many of you say. "Vocation? Profit? I don't own a business, so what do these have to do with me?" Recall that the Lions movement was founded by businessmen, and so it's not surprising that when it came time to draw up their Code of Ethics, they would draw heavily from the standards of business ethics. If we simplify these 3 points, we see that they can be restated as: • You'll be judged by your practices and standards. Keep them above reproach.

• Work hard, and always strive to do your best. It's OK to expect fair compensation for a job well done, but never seek "success" through dishonorable practices. • Improve your standing by improving yourself, not by hindering or hurting others. Hold yourself to the highest standards, and acknowledge those who made you successful. Stated in this way, we can see that these points apply not just to business owners, but to everyone. As Lions, we have an individual and collective obligation to strive to maintain high standards of service, gratefully accept contributions for well-run fund-raising activities, be trustworthy stewards of the funds that we receive, and always keep our supporters in mind as we carry out our mission of service to others. That's OUR business model. How about the other points of the

- Whenever a doubt arises as to the right or ethics of my position or action towards others, to resolve such doubt against myself. To Hold friendship as an end and not a means. To hold that true friendship exists not on account of the service performed by one to another, but that true friendship demands nothing but accepts service in the spirit in which it is given. Always to bear in mind my obligations as a citizen to my nation, my state, and my community, and to give them my unswerving loyalty in word, act, and deed. To give them freely of my time, labor and means.
- To Aid others by giving sympathy to those in distress. aid to the weak, and substance to the needy.
- To Be Careful with my criticism and liberal with praise; to build up and not destroy. Lions Clubs International has a well-deserved reputation for dedicated service to others, largely because we have worked hard to demonstrate that we care about people, and about doing what's right, with the Lions Clubs International Code of Ethics as our road map. LCI has designated the month of February as Childhood Cancer Awareness month. February 15th is International Childhood Cancer Day. Following are some of the things our club has been doing for this cause.

Our club formed a childhood cancer committee to help with this project. Several years ago, Lion Viki surveyed all the hospitals in Baltimore plus hospitals in other parts of Maryland, nearby Pennsylvania and West Virginia to find who had childhood cancer departments.

This list was given to all the clubs in our district for their use. Our committee decided that we would work with The Childhood Cancer Clinic at Sinai Hospital.

Before the pandemic, we asked the members for hats, gloves and scarves for the children. Now the hospital will not accept these items because of the virus. We purchased gas cards to be given to the parents to help with driving the children to their chemo and radiation treatments.

Every three months, we collect and purchase toys to

be given to the children to use while they are receiving their treatments. The children are sometimes at the clinic six to eight hours and they must take what



they were playing with home since no other child can play with that item.


