# **DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE**APRIL 2021 District Newsletter



Over the course of the three service challenges we had 22 different clubs that participated. SVDG Nadja and I want to express to you our sincere appreciation for your participation. Together, we helped to make a difference in the lives of others.

**GLENN OLIVER RICKARD, JR.,** 96 of Thurmont, MD., affectionately known as June, Rick, Buddy and Dad, slipped quietly and peacefully away and onto his heavenly journey on April 4, 2021 at Frederick Health Hospital. For almost 56 years he was the husband of Eleanor Louise (Griffith) Rickard, who predeceased him in 2011. Since 2013 he has been married to Mary Ethel (Michael) Rickard.

Born February 11, 1925 in Hagerstown, Md., he was the Son of Glenn Oliver and Mabel Leona (Hose) Rickard. Throughout a long and active lifetime, he was an electronic engineer for over 60 years, owning and selling a number of businesses, the last being Thurmont Radio and TV. Finding retirement boring, he re-entered employment with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) on their Emmitsburg, Md. 

#### All Good Lions:

I was asked where I would go to locate **younger Lions**. I answered that I would recruit in the 55+ communities developing in District 22-W. We often do not realize that being a Lion only has one age limit and that is our starting age of 18. A booklet available from Lions Clubs International provides guidance to clubs in attracting new, younger members (New Member Recruiting Guide for Clubs – ME 300) at <a href="https://temp.lionsclubs.org/EN/pdfs/me300.pdf">https://temp.lionsclubs.org/EN/pdfs/me300.pdf</a>. It also provides ideas you can use in your current club to keep Lions with new ideas satisfied in your club.

Your **North American Membership Initiative Committee** for Member Satisfaction encourages you to see how it can bring you greater success. The ideas below can be used to recruit Lions through service. The Lions Clubs International motto is "We Serve" — and there's no better way to attract members than to show Lions in action! Use the following tips to help plan your next service event in a way that will be attractive to prospective Young Lions.

- \* Start your recruitment with a service event, not a meeting.
- \* Find out what is important to people in your community.
- \* Perform a Club and Community Needs Assessment to understand issues that matter to them. You can download this assessment at <a href="lionsclubs.org/service-toolkit">lionsclubs.org/service-toolkit</a>.
- \* Speak directly with community members this shows them you care.
- \* Plan a hands-on, family-friendly event that addresses a need important to your community. Visit <u>lionsclubs.org/family-membership</u> to discover ideas to plan your next family service event with the Family Membership Program.
- \* Invite a variety of people, such as local college students, neighborhood groups, parent groups, local professionals and younger colleagues from your workplace.
- \* Use social media to attract younger people; meet them on their level!
- \* Make sure that all your events are fun, energized and dynamic younger people prefer active service events!
- \* Ensure that there will be tangible outcomes so that everyone feels they have contributed to making a positive impact. During your event
  - >Start on time, with a brief orientation beforehand.
  - >Supply enough tools and materials for everyone to be engaged.
  - >Engage all in the service project and not just the "heavy lifting" and clean-up.
  - >Take pictures of everyone you invited.
  - >Thank everyone and ask them how they enjoyed being "a Lion for the day." After your event Share pictures you took on social media.
  - >Ask attendees to use Facebook, Instagram and Snapchat so that your event is shared in their posts, getting likes from their friends, along with the global network of Lions.
- \* Remember to follow up and invite prospects to join you for another service event. Encourage them to bring friends and family members; your club's capacity to serve not just meet will attract more people.

#### LIONS VISION RESEARCH FOUNDATION (LVRF)

At the March 20, 2021 board meeting of the Lions Vision Research Foundation (LVRF), the trustees voted to put forth a resolution to the delegates of the MD22 Convention to modify the LVRF By-Laws. In accordance with the LVRF By-Laws (Article IX, section 2), I am notifying you that we are seeking approval of these changes and ask that you ensure that every club in your District receives notification of this information prior to April 20. The changes requested are as follows:

- i. Eliminate the Chairperson of the MD22 Council of Governors as a voting member of the LVRF Board of Trustees (Article II, Section 1.B).
- ii. Reduce the total number of voting Lions Trustees from twenty-two to twenty-one (Article II, Section 1.A) to reflect the elimination of the Council Chairperson as a trustee.
- iii. Eliminate Article VII of the LVRF By-laws in its entirety.
- iv. Make administrative adjustments to the Article numbers, table of content page numbers, and section headers to maintain continuity, consistency and correctness through the document.

**Rationale for change** i. - Brings the By-laws into agreement with LVRF's original Articles of Incorporation.

Rationale for change iii. - The current Article VII was adopted when the Low Vision Rehabilitation Network (LOVRNET) was established as an LVRF project.

LOVRNET has subsequently been set up as a separate corporate entity with its own governing body, by-laws, and tax identification number. As such, the language in Article VII is outdated and no longer properly describes the relationship between LVRF and LOVRNET.

Thank for your help in getting this info out to your District's clubs and Convention delegates.

OFFICERS! Please see this excerpt from the
Standard Club Constitution and By-Laws. The
full document can be viewed by clicking on
"Standard Club Constitution."

**Section 3. ELIGIBILITY FOR OFFICE.** No person shall be eligible to hold office in this club unless he/she is an active member in good standing.

Section 4. NOMINATING COMMITTEE. The president shall appoint a nominating

committee which shall submit the names of candidates for the various club offices to the club at the nomination meeting. At this meeting, nominations for all offices to be filled in the succeeding year may also be made from the floor

Section 5. NOMINATION MEETING. A nomination meeting shall be held in March of each year or as determined by the board of directors, with the date and place of such meeting to be determined by the board of directors. Section 6. ELECTION. An election shall be held in April or as determined by the board of directors, at a time and place determined by the board of directors. Notice of the election shall be published by regular post or electronic means or by personal delivery to each member of the club at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior the date of the election. Such notice shall include the names of all nominees approved at the preceding nomination meeting, and, subject to Section 3 above, a statement that these nominees will be voted upon at this election. No nominations may be made from the floor at the election.

Secretaries are reminded to report club officers in MyLCI as soon as officers are elected.

#### **RECRUITING HEROES**

They don't magically appear from nowhere like their fantasy counterparts; the real life heroes in Washington County who volunteer as firefighters and emergency workers are carefully recruited and trained for the arduous and often life-threatening challenges that will lie before them.

Heading the recruitment effort is Chandler Fishack from Smithsburg, whose official title is Recruitment and Retention Coordinator, Washington County Volunteer Fire and Rescue Association. Lion Jim Fritsch introduced Chandler as presenter at the April 6 meeting on zoom. In addition to the firefighters and EMS volunteers,

Chandler actively seeks others for supportive roles including leaders for fund raising events and administrative staff to work behind the scenes. You don't have to be young and muscular to serve, he emphasized, whatever your age or abilities "we have a job for you." Being excited and enthusiastic about the opportunity to serve neighbors and community is the major factor Chandler looks for in his work.

He utilizes ads in print, TV and social media to spark interest. Retaining volunteers is also a key aspect of Chandler's position. The intangible factor of serving others, especially in critical situations where property and lives are at stake, and where a volunteer's actions or even his or her presence may make a key difference, carries its own reward. But there are tangible rewards as well.

One key benefit is the Length of Service Award Program (LOSAP) based on years of service and volunteer points (50 needed per year) that provides significant financial rewards. The state of Maryland also grants a tax credit (currently \$4500) after three years of service.

Along with the unpaid volunteers that comprise 94% of the staff of WCVFRA there are 33 hired personnel. The two groups work together in a spirit of mutual cooperation and respect.

#### FOOD DISTRIBUTION— HAGERSOWN LIONS

Hagerstown Lions Club's second effort at distributing much needed supplies of food to hungry recipients occurred Saturday morning, April 24, at Otterbein UM Church in downtown Hagerstown. Maryland Food Bank delivered 120 boxes (approximately 22 pounds each) of fresh produce (cabbage, cantaloupe, onions, potatoes, squash) early that morning.

During the scheduled distribution time of 10 AM – Noon, Club volunteers gave out 111 of those boxes to grateful recipients who arrived in cars, pickups or on foot; project coordinator Lion Brooks McBurney delivered the remainder to Salvation Army.

Other participating Lions were Jim and Noveda Clem, Jim Fritsch, Andy Hoffman, Dave Kaplan, Paul Leatherman, Ralph Myers, Teddy Newman and Susan Timmons. We're also grateful to Cindy Brown of Otterbein and Joan Balbunca of Bester Community of Hope who stopped by to ensure the distribution was running smoothly, and to the Staff of Salvation Army who assisted distributing the food in the unclaimed boxes from Otterbein.

In the two food projects the Club has distributed a total of 288 boxes with an adjusted gross weight of 8,352 pounds. The more extensive preparation, publicity and location of Otterbein Church resulted in many more recipients than our initial effort last fall at Haven Church. We intend to follow this format in future distributions.

#### **BOOK DISTRIBUTION XII**

One more step back to old time normalcy for the Club: we anticipate another book distribution before the end of the school year! Possible elementary school sites are: St. Mary's, Emma K. Doub and Paramount. Actual date, time and location of the event will be announced soon. Unlike pre-pandemic distributions, however, Global Service Chair Lion Brooks McBurney, has announced that it will simply be a delivery of books to the selected school without the possibility of entering the display area and setting up.

Since we want to ensure that all delivered books are in good condition and age appropriate, we'll have a predelivery screening on May 5 at 1 PM (with perhaps a toast to Cinco de Mayo!) in the back of Penn Avenue Plaza, at the rear of Hunt Audio (right next to the book storage center of Paul Needy's shop). # EVER WONDER ABOUT ST. PATRICK'S DAY?? FOLLOWING IS A WRITE UP FROM LION LYNN



St. Patrick's Day It's a national

holiday in both Ireland and Northern Ireland. St. Patrick Wasn't Irish St. Patrick was born to Roman parents in Scotland or Wales in the 4th century. St. Maewyn's Day? According to Irish legend, St. Patrick's birth name was Maewyn Succat, but he changed his name to Patricius after becoming a priest.

Dry Holiday For most of the 20th century, St. Patrick's Day was considered a religious holiday in Ireland, meaning the nation's pubs were closed for business on 3/17. (The one exception went to beer vendors at the big national dog show, always held on St. Patrick's Day.)

In 1970, the day was converted to a national holiday. Shamrocks The shamrock become associated with St. Patrick when he used the three-leafed plant as a metaphor for the Holy Trinity when introducing Christianity to Ireland.

Leprechauns In traditional Irish folk tales, there are no female leprechauns, only nattily attired little guys. And they earned that gold they're guarding. According to legend, leprechauns spend their days making and mending shoes. It's hard work, so you can't blame them for being territorial about their pots of gold.

The Lingo Makes Sense "Erin go Bragh" is a corruption of the Irish Éirinn go Brách, which means roughly "Ireland Forever." Driving Out the Snakes In Irish Iore, St. Patrick is credited with driving all the snakes out of Ireland. Modern scientists suggest that the job might not have been too hard; Ireland has never been home to any snakes. Through the Ice Age, Ireland was too cold to host any reptiles; the surrounding seas have staved off serpentine invaders ever since. Modern scholars think the "snakes" St. Patrick drove away were likely metaphorical.

No Corn in Corned Beef Corned beef and cabbage, a traditional St. Patrick's Day staple, has nothing to do with the grain corn; instead, it's a nod to the large grains of salt that were historically used to cure meats, which were known as "corns."

U. S. Festivities New York City's St. Patrick's **Day Parade is** one of the world's largest parades. Since 1762, 250,000 marchers have marched up Fifth Avenue on foot; the parade doesn't allow floats, cars, etc. **Chicago has been celebrating St. Patrick by dumping 40 tons of green dye into the Chicago River since 1962**






