Region IV Lions Clubs Service Project – Diabetic Alert Service Dog Fund Raiser

Lions, you never know when a **SERVICE** opportunity will present itself.

On May 17, 2021, I received a request for help from a member of the Westminster Community. A mother called me and made a request for help getting a Diabetic Alert Service Dog for her son to Taylorsville Winfield Lions Club. He is a Graduating Senior at Westminster High School.

He was diagnosed with Type I diabetes at age 3. He has attended Lion's Camp Merrick a few times. He is on a Continuous Glucose Monitor (CGM) that alarms him and his mother's cell phone. He is also on an Insulin Pump. On occasions his blood sugars have dropped low at night while he's asleep and the alarm from the CGM hasn't been able to waken him. It did alarm her and she was able to help him. He is under the care of a doctor at Sinai Hospital and the family reports monthly the readings from the CGM and the pump to her for adjustments.

A Diabetic Alert Service Dog was suggested to them by their family support group. They researched this and chose to get a dog from Diabetic Alert Dogs of America (DADA). They put down a deposit of \$2,500 for a dog named "Morgan" (see Picture below). They owe a balance of \$13,000 upon delivery of Morgan. At this time Morgan should arrive in October. They are also looking into Veterinary Insurance for the dog and also Life insurance on the dog.

Her son has been accepted into University of Delaware and will begin there in the Fall 2021. They have talked to Univ. of Del. and they have agreed to make accommodations for the dog. His future roommates have also approved of him having a Service dog.

I responded to the Mother that this was a big project for just one Lion Club but that I would investigate and get back to her. Over the next week I email and spoke with various Lions in our Region and District and this project took legs. I talked with then Region Chair Jeremy Bair and PDG Brian Cox. We contacted the American Diabetes Association and were turned down. PDG Cox counseled that this would probably not qualify for a grant and the process was a long one. We decided to make it a Region effort, with the blessing of RCE Rachel Graham, and approach our 16 clubs to help this family.

I am proud to say that this far we have raised \$6,750. Donations have come from 7 Lions Clubs in Region IV, a Club outside the District, a church and a Non-Profit Foundation. At this time other Clubs in Region IV are considering making a donation.

Lions Quest is an LCIF Program

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has a social and emotional learning program called Lions Quest that teaches children decision-making skills, communication skills, and how to say no to drugs and alcohol. The Lions Quest program promotes positivity and support, to increase their well-being and academic achievement. It is an all-inclusive approach that helps students develop the skills to create good relationships with themselves and with others.

The concept behind Lions Quest dates to 1975 and was designed to help young people develop the skills and strength of character needed to succeed as adults. In 1984, LCIF became involved with the program by providing a grant to further expand the program. In 2002, LCIF took formal ownership of Lions Quest. The foundation has awarded more \$20 million in grants to establish or expand Lions Quest programs across the United States and around the world. Our district has received \$50,000 in Lions Quest grants to develop programs in three of our four regions. Local Lions Clubs are important to the success and expansion of Lions Quest, supporting the program through local funding, coordinating teacher training, co-hosting parent meetings, speaking to youth, and undertaking joint service projects with students. The success of Lions Quest relies on the Lions who champion the program in their own communities.

Lions Quest is a skill-building program that uses free-standing lessons to promote social and emotional development for students in kindergarten through twelfth grade. Lions Quest is designed to establish caring, participatory, and well-managed learning environments. The Lions Quest approach helps to establish the learning conditions that young people need to be capable, healthy, and successful in all areas of life. The lessons and activities provide coverage for all five Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning Institute for the integration of cognitive and social-emotional curriculum competencies of:

- ✓ Self-awareness
- ✓ Self-management
- ✓ Social awareness
- ✓ Relationship skills
- ✓ Responsible decision-making

Renewing Membership after Covid

While last year we had the North America Membership Initiative, we also were challenged by Covid, the lack of in person events and meetings, and the use of Zoom to provide orientation and membership training. This year we move toward the Global Membership Approach. District Governor Charlie Croft and his Global Action Team are the driving force of the Global Membership Approach, which combines a strategic approach and a set of resources for district teams to utilize to develop membership and achieve a positive net growth by:

- · Rejuvenating districts with new clubs
- · Revitalizing clubs with new members
- · Re-motivating existing members with fellowship and exciting service.

The approach has universal applicability, with the ability to customize based on regional needs and circumstances. To meet this approach, DG Charlie has the following membership goals:

- ✓ New Members By the end of 2021/2022 fiscal year, our district will add 150 new members by the end of 2021-2022.
- ✓ Membership Retention By the end of 2021/2022, our district will reduce the number of dropped members to 140 including those lost to death, thereby increasing net membership by 10.
- ✓ New Clubs By the end of 2021/2022 fiscal year, our district will form one new conventional or cyber club with at least 25 new members, one new branch club with at least 10 members and at least one campus club with 15 new members.

All clubs can benefit from promotion; and press releases, social media postings, etc. aren't just for your big fundraising events.

If you have speakers at your meetings, that's good for two releases -- one saying the speaker will be there and one showing he/she was. Same for your big fundraisers—promote before, celebrate afterward.

Take pictures when performing service projects; show your community what Lions—and in particular, your club—do to improve the world for everyone. One caveat: if there are children in the photo, get parent/guardian permission before using. Some parents maintain a tight rein over having their child's image posted to social media.

If your community has a local radio station, FCC regulations require they make time for <u>free</u> public service announcements. Remember to KISS (keep it short and sweet) your PSAs; many radio outlets prefer releases in 15-, 30-, and 60-second lengths. Before submitting your copy, do some test runs to see how many seconds it takes.

Be creative with your marketing and communications; if you have a really good idea, be sure to let your 22W Chairman Lion Lynn Stimmel and MD-22 Chairman PDG Susan Bonura know!


Thurmont Lions Club presents "Lion of the Year" Award

First, let me tell you a little about our Melvin Jones Fellow. Our honoree is not a native of Carroll County. That should narrow it down at least a bit!

Our honoree has never served on the Board of Directors of the Lions Club. Our new Melvin Jones Fellow has been a volunteer with several other community service organizations.

Can't guess who it is yet? OK, so the rest of this will give it away...

Our honoree was born in New Jersey and raised in Bethesda, Maryland. She went back to New Jersey for college and a career in health care. She returned to Maryland in 2004 to take a new job and bought and restored an old 8-acre farm in Finksburg. She married her husband, Lion Mark, here in 2011.

So, by now most of you have probably guessed that our Melvin Jones Fellow is Lion Diana Fraser.

Lion Diana has been a member of the Westminster Lions Club since 2014. With a background in communications, she soon became the Newsletter Editor for the Club and continues to produce the monthly newsletter to this day. She also creates flyers, posters, and programs for our events.

In 2015, Lion Diana and Lion Mark organized the 75th Anniversary Charter Gala, a memorable celebration held at the St. John's Portico, that actually made money for the Club. Lion Diana often serves with the Lions at the Church of the Brethren Soup Kitchen and has helped out at various fundraisers, including the 4-H Fair, FallFest, and the Steak Feeds.

Early in 2020, she and Mark were instrumental in working with the Community Foundation to get our charitable foundation status. Just a few months later, the Covid-19 pandemic arrived and having that charitable status turned out to be an important part of our ability to help the community when we couldn't raise money through our usual fundraisers.

On behalf of the Club, Lion Diana and Lion President Lee Miller applied for and received a \$1,000 grant from the Kahlert Foundation to provide groceries and supplies to area food pantries. Then, when federal grant money became available, Lion Diana applied for and received two \$5,000 grants for the Club. We have been using these grants to provide food and supplies to residents who were negatively impacted by the pandemic.

On behalf of the Lions Vision Research Foundation, we extend our congratulations on being recognized with a LVRF Knights of the Blind Pyramid. The Knights of the Blind distinction evokes the spirit of Helen Keller, famed advocate for the sightless everywhere. It is largely through the Knights of the Blind recognition that the Lions Vision Research Foundation is able to continue our mission to educate eye care professionals, conduct research that's improving the quality of life for low vision patients, and making low vision services more readily available in our area. These advances, through the work of the Lions Low Vision Center at Wilmer Eye Institute, are because you cared enough to support our Foundation.

Patients like 28-year-old Anna L. who lost sight from an autoimmune disease. Legally blind, Anna has restored her confidence and will to thrive through mobility training, walking with a cane, using an optic magnifier, and other coping strategies. Another patient with a good outcome is Leslie B, a 31-year-old professional in career development. Leslie became legally blind due to a brain aneurism. Working with the Low Vision Rehabilitation Center and Wilmer, Leslie is training her eyes to adapt to a low vision computer that allows her to continue her professional career.

Your support has assisted with funding the Lions Low Vision Rehabilitation Fellowship Program that has been a project for the last several years. Ophthalmologists and optometrists who have a strong interest in vision rehabilitation and have a solid foundation in basic clinical skill, including diagnosis and management of primary eye care disorders are eligible candidates that apply for the Fellowship. The selected Fellow participates in community awareness programs and is encouraged to complete a clinical research project during the fellowship year. Several of the Fellows have continued their careers working in the area of vision rehabilitation and direct care of the low vision patient. Within the continental United States, only two programs are offered like this one. Your continual support allows the Foundation to support forerunners in the field of low vision rehabilitation.


