Hurricane "Carla" struck Southern Texas in September 1961. To assist in the relief program District 22-W Lions Clubs donated food and clothing for shipment to Lions of District 2-S-2. Twenty-one Lions Clubs in Carroll, Frederick and Washington Counties participated in this rush program gathering over 15,000 pounds of merchandise which was flown by the Air Force Reserve to the disaster area.

On July 1, 1963 the District had a membership of 2,023 in 43 clubs<sup>7</sup> there being no change in the number of clubs on June 30, 1964 with a membership of 2,006.

District project was establishing Glaucoma Clinics in several cities in the District. Although this project did not become a reality progress was made in the planning and operation and funds of over \$1,100.00 raised for promoting, establishing and operating the clinics. However arrangements were made and District 22-W became a working part of the Maryland Eye Bank Association. Permission was granted by the Association to solicit eye donors. Donor cards were distributed to the clubs and eye shipping containers, donated by the Association, were distributed to all hospitals within the District. Also in connection with eye conservation over 6,000 used eye glasses were collected and shipped to a distribution center suggested by Lions International.

Past International Director Massey H. Roe was one of twelve named to receive the coveted award and honor as "Ambassador of Good Will" by Immediate Past President Curtis D. Lovill. Past International Directors Massey H. Roe and G. Robert Lyles were the recipients of the Presidential Award presented by Immediate Past President Curtis D. Lovill. This is the third Presidential Award presented to Past International Director Massey H. Roe.

Awards by Lions International to Lions of the District include 1 Master Key, 8 Advancement Keys, 21 Membership Keys and the 100% District Governors Award to District Governor Joy.

District Governor Joy served as Acting Chairman of the Council of Governors during the illness of the Chairman, District Governor Moore.

Gwynn, Jr. at the District Social; the 45th Charter Anniversary of the Frederick Club; and as speaker at the 35th Charter Night Celebration of the Lonaconing Club; International Third Vice-President W.R. Bryan at the Cumberland Club; Past International Directors J. K. Donovan and Abe Summers at the District Social; Past International Director Ralph Blaney at the 26th Charter Night of the Westminster Club and Past International Director Charles Mowery at the Past District Governors Night at the Mount Airy Club.

During the year a "SEARCH FOR PEACE" essay contest was sponsored by Lions International, Districts and Clubs. Thirty-one clubs in our District submitted their winning essays. At the Fiftieth Anniversary Celebration held at Frock's on January 14, 1967, which featured a message from International President Edward Lindsey, via sound color film, depicting Fifty Years of Lionism, the essay winner of our District was announced as William Linthicum of Middleburg, Maryland, sponsored by the Terra Rubra Club. On July 1, 1967 there were 44 clubs in the district with 2,010 members. As of June 30, 1968 there were 45 clubs with 2,071 members, an increase of one club and 61 members.

A new Lions Club was organized in the Leitersburg, Paramount, Spring Valley and Maugansville area of Washington County, co-sponsored by the Chewsville and Hagerstown Lions Club, with 42 charter members. The name selected by the members was Longmeadow Lions Club. The Charter Presentation program was held in the Delmar Inn with Lions International Past President Dr. Walter H. Campbell as the speaker.

Lions International notified District Governor J. Franklin Shank that District 22-W had qualified to send a representative to the World Youth Conference in Dallas, Texas. This was made possible through efforts of the Membership and Retention Chairman and Lions of 22-W who acquired the greatest net increase in membership in the sub-districts of Multiple District 22. The Roaring Run Lions Club who had the greatest net increase selected James J. Schwartz, Jr., based on his citizenship merits, to represent Multiple District 22 at this great event.

During the year Lions International awarded to Lions in District 22-W a total of 31 Membership Keys, 4 Membership Advancement Keys, 1 Master Key and 2 Extension Awards. Lions International also awarded to District Governor Shank the 100% District Governor Award.

Lion dignitaries visiting our District during the year were Lions International Past Presidents Harold Nutter and Dr. Walter H. Campbell; Lions International First Vice-President David A. Evans; Lions International Second Vice-President W.R. Bryan and Past International Directors Thomas S. Gwynn, Abe Summers and John A. K. Donovan. Our Past International Director Massey H. Roe is always present, willing and ready to serve when called.

During the year Lions of District 22-W contributed in excess of \$7,000.00 to the Medical Eye Bank of Maryland, Inc. Eye donors were also signed and cards forwarded to the Eye Bank.

Twin Clubs from the South American continent were adopted by the Hagerstown, Freedom District, Taneytown and Chewsville Lions Clubs. The Hancock Lions Club engaged in the Youth Exchange program. Approximately one-third of the Clubs of District 22-W sponsored Scholarship grants.

The "Roaring Lions" speaking course was reactivated with sixteen graduates, eight each in Region I and Region IV.

The District Social was held at the Venice Restaurant in Hagerstown on October 7, 1967 with nearly 450 Lions and Lionesses attending. The speaker was Lions International First Vice-President David Evans who presented an outstanding message.

At the District Convention held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, Past International Director Thomas S. Gwynn of 22-C nominated Past District Governor George E. Davidson of 22-A as a candidate for the office of International Director to represent Multiple District 22 with the nomination being seconded by Past District Governor Ralph N. Helm of 22-D.

At the Necrology services during the convention tribute was paid to 34 Lions who passed to the great beyond during the year. Included in the memorial list were Past District Governor William G. Heagy of the Westminster Club and Past District Governor Charles "Doc" I. Joy of the Libertytown-Unionville Club.

Past District Governor Harry E. Filler of the Glade Valley Lions Club served as Vice-Chairman of the Convention Committee.

Chairman of the Membership and Retention Committee, David L. Brauning of the Roaring Run Lions Club, was elected to serve as District Governor of 22-W for the fiscal year 1968-1969. In accepting the honor and responsibility he pledged a better and greater image of Lionism during his administration.

On July 1, 1968 the district was composed of 45 clubs with a total membership of 2,071. Although there was no change in the number of clubs the membership increased to 2,098 as of June 30, 1969.

District 22-W Hospitality Night held on October 5, 1968, was enjoyed by Lions and Lionesses with the highlight of the evening being an inspirational address by International Director A. James Lundberg of Provo, Utah. This event was arranged by the Special Events Committee with Past International Director Massey H. Roe as chairman.

Our District was also honored with visits by International Director George E. Davidson and Past International Directors Thomas S. Gwynn, John A. K. Donovan, Abe Summers and Joseph W. Ganim. Our own P. I. D. Massey H. Roe as usual is ready to serve at all times.

With 30 clubs participating contributions to the Medical Eye Bank of Maryland, Inc. exceeded \$7,000.00. Many clubs presented programs on sight conservation and signed up eye donors.

An additional \$690.00 was raised and contributed to CARE to complete the construction of the school in the Phillipines. This donation brings a very worthwhile project to a successful conclusion through the understanding and cooperation of concerned Lions.

A new project was introduced under the sponsorship of the Roaring Run Lions Club, the home club of District Governor Brauning. This project of Pre-School Vision Screening was given to 1,100 three and four year old children to detect amblyopia ex-anopsia, commonly known as "Lazy Eyes". The object of this program is to detect this condition before age six so that corrective measures can be taken to prevent "Lazy Eye" blindness. Fourteen Lions Clubs participated in this program which was directed and supervised by Lioness (Mrs.) Arthur Sullivan, III, R N.

During the year several clubs participated in the Twin Clubs and Youth Exchange projects. Several clubs awarded scholarship grants to graduating students to assist in furthering their education.

The "Roaring Lions" speaking course was again conducted with two classes, one each in Region I and Region IV, with 13 completing the course, a total of 221 to date.

During the year Lions International awarded a total of 26 Membership Keys, 8 Membership Advancement Keys to Lions in our District and the 100% District Governors Award to District Governor David L. Brauning. Past International Director Massey H. Roe also received the Presidential Award from International President David A. Evans.

Past District Gove Bor Harry E. Filler served as Chairman of the Multiple District Convention and with the assistance of his two committee members produced an outstanding convention.

Lion G. Wilbur Boller of the Freedom District Lions Club who had served on the cabinet as a Zone Chairman and Deputy District Governor and as Chairman of the Membership Development and Retention Committee, was elected Governor of District 22-W for the fiscal year 1969-1970.
