Constitution and By-Laws Chairman Lion Roger Moore, P.D.G. reported the following change was adopted at the Multiple District Convention for the Multiple District.

Article VI Section I, Article VIII Section I, Article IX Section I and Article XI Section I be amended to read July 1 and January 1 wherever August 1 and February 1 appear.

The conventions and USA/Canada Leadership Forum chaired by Lion Carl Welsh reported the District Convention had 236 registrants from District 22W with a total registration of 1611. District Newsletter - Lion Hilda Newcomer again provided the District with an informative newsletter.

Nominations Chair Lion J. Franklin Shank, P.D.G. announced that we had one candidate for District Governor, Lion Margarito L. Ochoa of the Thurmont Club, and one candidate for Vice District Governor, Cecil M. Massie of the Union Bridge Lions Club. Each was duly elected at the District Convention in Ocean City, Maryland.

Pin Coordinator Lion Roy L. Davis coordinated the pin sales. The 22W pin featured Allegheny County and the multiple District pin featured a pineapple in conjunction with the International Convention in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Public Relations Chair Lion George A Riley, Jr. reported thirty-five Lions Clubs and three Lioness Clubs sent newsletters to the q,airman. Sixteen clubs participated in the scrapbook contest. The winners were:

Another recommendation was that the procedures manual be amended in accordance with the constitution and by-laws which states that a meeting of the Honorary Committee can be called by either the District Governor or by the committee with the immediate Past District Governor acting as Chairman. It also recommended that the constitution and by-laws committee resolve the conflict in terminology between the constitution and by-laws and the procedures manual regarding the Finance Committee.

The response was excellent and dedicated in four categories: middle school, high school, adult non-Lion and Lion/ Lioness. Each winner received a \$100.00 savings bond, an American Flag, and a certificate of appreciation.

Constitution and Bylaws Chair, Lion David A. Fisher, PDG, reported there were no constitutional changes to the District 22W Constitution and Bylaws. The Multiple District 22 had a proposed change pertaining to the appointment of a council secretary and treasurer from outside the group of sitting governors. The proposal was properly presented and voted on by District 22W and was passed by the delegates of the Multiple District.

The Conventions and USA/ Canada Leadership Forum, chaired by Lion Carl Welsh, reported District 22W was well represented with 20 members in Tucson, Arizona. The Multiple District 22W Convention was held in Ocean City with 249 Lions, Lionesses, and guests from District 22W. International President, Jean Behar, was present for the entire convention. IP Behar presented PDG Dave Fisher with the IP's Leadership Medal.

Diabetes Awareness Chair, Lion Donna S. Jackman, was outstanding coordinating this committee. The second annual "Kiss a Pig"contest was a huge success, realizing a total of \$16,227.02.

Extension chair, Lion E. Larue Sipes, reported the new branch club program was promoted throughout the district and appeared to spark some interest, but with no results.

The Finance Committee, chaired by Lion Allen Ward, PDG, and Vice Chair, Clare Newcomer, PDG, assisted with the budget which was presented to and approved by the cabinet. The committee, in conjunction with the Research and Long Range Planning Chair, and Website Coordinator, evaluated the financial impact of the new district website and possible sources of income to support it.

Hearing and Speech Action Chair, Lion Brooks E. Widder, reported the district cabinet voted to donate one half of the used hearing aids collected to the Lions of District 301 in the Philippines. The hearing aids were given to children of farmers living on a meager existence. These individuals could not afford the six months family income needed to obtain a hearing aid for their child. To show their gratitude for our assistance, a speech therapy school in Bacarra City, 300 miles north of Manila, will be officially named the "Lions District 22W of the State of Maryland".

Int mational Relations and Peace Poster Chair, Lion Hugo W. Cardenas, reported seventeen entries were received. Alexis Miller, an 8th grade student was the winner for District 22W. Her poster was also declared the winner for the Multiple District. Alexis was sponsored by the Sharpsburg Lions Club.

Leadership Development Chair, Lion Carl E Ebaugh, provided programs to many clubs. Training sessions for new cabinet and club officers were held in early June. Our Leadership Chair participated in the Multiple District 22 Extension-Leadership-Membership (ELM) Team. Plans for formal training were developed and will be implemented during the next year.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) Chair, Lion Clare M. Newcomer, PDG, reported November was designated as "Contributing Member Month". LCIF Week was observed January 8-14, 2002. At the Multiple District Convention, delegates approved the request of the Hagerstown Lions Club to submit an application to LCIF for a Core 4 grant to be used for building a home in Washington County for a disabled individual and family in collaboration with the Habitat for Humanity program. Clubs donated more than \$27,000 to LCIF in 2000-2001.

Lions Vision Research Foundation (LVRF) Chair, Robert J. Miller, PDG, reported the three-year fund raising effort was to raise \$4,000,000. As of December 31, 2000, the total was \$2,400,000. The Lions and Lionesses of 22W gave a total of \$654,441.62. Since the endowment is not yet fully funded, we still need to help support the gift giving where possible.

Lioness Associate Coordinator Lion / Lioness Mary L. Stains reported the year began wth four Lioness clubs and ended with three. The Lioness clubs continued to have service and fundraising projects.

Membership Chair, Lion John Hopkins, provided information and awareness and membership orientations. However, we still had a membership decrease of 1.5 %. 165 new members and 197 members lost (includes 40 deaths).

Newsletter editor, Lion Brian Cox, gave the newsletter a new look this year by adding a look back at Lionism throughout the years. He also transmitted information and invitations to district and club events in lieu of separate mailings.

Nominations Chair, Lion Roy S. Cool, PDG, reported we had one candidate for the office of District Governor, Vice District Governor Cecil M. Massie of the Union Bridge club. We had two candidates for the office of Vice District Governor; Zone Chair, John W. Humphries of the Jefferson Club, and Zone Chair Rooney J. Welch of the Potomac Valley Club. VDG Cecil Massie and Zone Chair Rodney J. Welch were elected at the District Convention in Ocean City, MD on May 17, 2001.

Public Relations Chair, Lion Dona (Doe) Humphries, offered a program based on six objectives; 1) building and internally regarding the objectives and services of Lions, Lionesses, and Leos, 2) fostering the concept that public relations is a prime factor in achieving and maintaining community support, 3) emphasizing the need for quality image, 4) the importance of being knowledgeable about the district and association, 5) objective public relations is the responsibility of each individual, and 6)assisting with public relations efforts at the club, zone, and regional levels. We enjoyed outstanding media coverage in local papers, district newsletter and website, the LION Magazine, , and television/radio coverage on Lions Vision Days. Club scrapbook winners at the district level were: 1st place - Freedom District Lion and Lioness, 2nd place - Thurmont Lions and Hancock Lioness, and 3rd place - Taneytown Lions and Hagerstown Lions. Multiple District winners were: Grand Award- Laurel Lions (22-D), 1st place - Frederick Spring Creek Lions (22-D) and Freedom District Lioness, 2nd place - Thurmont Lions and Dover Lioness (22-D).

Research and Long Range Planning Chair, Lion Mark E. Gree, was asked to review the district's need for a website. The committee recommended that the district purchase one copy of Adobe Acrobat software (to be transferred to each administration bulletin editor) and begin publishing/ delivering the newsletter via this means to recipients with e-mail addresses. The committee recommended that ongoing monitoring be conducted to insure that its use be cost effective. The committee, along with the honorary committee, was asked to review the rotation schedule for candidates for the position of Vice District Governor. After much discussion, no clear conclusion was reached. It was recommended to support equal representation from each region, but not hold the rotation as a hard and fast rule.

Roaring Lions Chair, Lion Andrew S. DeMario, Sr, PDG, said that even though Roaring Lions classes were encouraged, none developed.

Sight Projects Coordinator, Roger Moore, PDG, stressed the need to support the LVRF Endowment Fund. 22,000 used eye gasses were collected and made available to third world countries. The district collected \$5,500. for leaderdog and \$6,500. for the medical eye bank and white cane days

Social Director, Lion David A. Fisher, PDG, chaired another outstanding district social. The guest speaker PID Mick Barrus, travels extensively for Lions Clubs International focusing on membership and leadership. The program book and sales netted \$3,000 for LVRF.

Vehicle Tags Chair, Lion George A. Riley, Jr. reported ten applications for Lions vehicle tags were processed.

PID Lion Murray Ryan continues to provide guidance and counsel to the district.

Website Coordinator, Lion Carol W. Smith, PDG, reported our website was rejuvenated this year with changes in the web address and internet server provider. The goal is to have every club in our district represented with their own club page or a link to their sites.

Youth Outreach/ Leo Clubs Chair, Lion Russell K. Mills, reported a Leo Club was sponsored by the Hagerstown Lions Club. They were very active and made a noticeable impact in the community. The annual Lions Night at the Ball Park raised over \$16,000, despite heavy rain that caused the game to be cancelled. We also had one exchange student from Italy visit us for one month.

American Heritage, Preservation & Patriotism Chair reported 18 clubs participated with over 160 entries.

Camp Merrick Co-Chairs note that all 5 sub-districts benefit from the program. Camp improvements are still required. An LCI grant was requested to repair hurricane damage.

Chaplain says to "keep praying".

Constitution and By-Laws Chair will provide a revised copy of it after conventions have completed.

Convention Chair MD-22 reported 1171 persons attended convention. 218 people represented 47 clubs from District 22-W. VDG Green was elected Governor;" Buck Fisher" was elected VDG, both by majority vote. The 87th LCI Convention was also well attended.

Diabetes Awareness Chair reported 6 Lions participated in "Kiss-A-Pig" contest with \$10,230 raised. With other donations, a grand total of \$18,051 was collected. Programs were presented to 10 clubs.

Disaster Relief Chair reported many calls were received after Hurricane Isabel inquiring as to any needs in District 22-W.

Extension Chair Attended Meetings of MD-22 MERL Team and seminars at USA/Canada Forum

Finance Chair reviewed the budget and found it to be in order.

Hearing and Speech Action Chair reported 7 clubs provided cash donations. Several programs have b en presented. It appears many clubs are not reporting activities to the District.

Historian reported Dist 22-W history is being updated.

Information Technology Chair reported Website was updated and functional.

International Relations Chair was a speaker at 2 clubs. No clubs were interested in the twinning program. Lions Day at the United Nations was held in March and Lions Worldwide Induction Day was April 1st. No interest was shown toward an International Club Interclub Program.

Jaycees Coordinator spoke to a joint meeting of three clubs to invite Frederick Jaycees into Lionism. Hancock and Westminster Lions are still active in JCI activities. We have not been very successful in getting "aging out" Jaycees tojoin Lions.

Leader Dog Chair reported 100% participation of District 22-W Lions Clubs. Total contributions to "Leader Dogs For The Blind" totaled \$17,945, an increase of \$763 over last year. The\$ rallies were attended by a total of 414 persons.

Leadership Development Chair spoke to different clubs regarding leadership and associated problems. Training for club officers was held in 2 locations with very good attendance.

Liberty Day Chair reported 4 clubs presented Liberty Day programs. Some schools have requested a program for next year.

Lions Clubs International Chair reported that \$31,443 was contributed to LCIF. District 22 -Wadded 38 new Melvin Jones Fellows, bringing the total to 500. Many clubs are sending donations directly to LCIF and this count may not be up to date. There were also 26 Progressive Awards given

Lions Vision Research Foundation Chair headed up another successful banquet. LVRF is now short \$713,339 of the \$4million goal.

Lioness Associate Coordinator reported we have 149 Lionesses serving in 3 clubs within District 22-W. 1 Lioness was named a Melvin Jones Fellow.

Membership Chair reported a net increase in membership of +3.

Newsletter Editor published monthly bulletins and posted it on the District 22-W website.

Nominations Chair reported Mark Green was the only nominee for District Governor and "Buck" Fisher the only nominee for Vice District Governor. Both were voted into office at the MD 22 Convention.

Peace Poster Chair reported 394 entries from 6 clubs in District 22-W.The first place winner of 22-W did not win at the MD 22 Convention.

Pin Coordinatrr said the response to pin sales has been poor to date. The pins were on sale at the MD 22 Convention.

Pre-School Eye Screening Chair reported the LCIF grant request from MD 22 had been approved. The chairman of the MD 22 Committee resigned to seek the office of VDG. The Council of Governors appointed a new chair, PDG Albert Baker of District 22-A. Approximately 2/3 of the clubs in District 22-W indicated a willingness to participate in the program. Screening programs were presented to numerous clubs for training purposes. The LVRF \$200,000 has to be matched by \$70,000 which will come from participating clubs in MD 22. This will amount to \$700 per club payable over 3 years. The grant period runs from 1 Jan 04 to 31 Dec 06.

Public Relations and Scrapbook Chair announces that 10 clubs participated in the contest. 6 m professional men and women had a challenging task judging the entries

Research and Long Range Planning Chair noted they reviewed the Policy and Procedure Manual and presented changes to the voting Cabinet. The changes were approved.

Retention Chair reported that as part of the MERL team, all clubs have been encouraged to concentrate on retention and to make the club environment open to all.

Roaring Lions Chair reported that no clubs participated in the program this year.

Sight Conservation and White Cane Chair reported that a total of 48,362 pair of glasses were shipped this year. Many clubs participated in White Cane Day activities Over 100,000 pairs of glasses have been shipped to Mexico from District 22-W.

Social Director reported 207 persons attended the District 22-W Social with 32 reciprocal guests. Proceeds from the program booklet of \$5,037 were donated to LVRF.

Song Leader reported that a patriotic song of some type is a part of each opening ceremony of all clubs. Raise our voices and show our pride.

USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum Chair said that 14 persons were registered for the event and 10 attended the MD-22 breakfast. 16 persons are registered for the upcoming Forum.

Vehicle Tag Chair has received 17 applications this year. 7 other requests are pending.

Women's Membership Development Chair reported that District 22-W has the most women of any of the Sub-Districts. A record of more than 27,000 women have become Lions.

Youth Outreach/LEO Clubs Chair reported the Westminster Lions Club has sponsored the new Winters Mill Leo Club as the third Leo Club in the District. Several clubs show interest in forming a new eo club. 39 clubs with a net profit of \$1,102 supported the "Suns" baseball game.

American Heritage, Preservation & Patriotism Chair reported good representation from the District. One Club had 200 participants.

Camp Merrick Co-Chairs note that \$2,632 was donated to the program. The monies will be used to support 3 children to one week at Camp.

Chaplain says to "keep praying", and a pleasure to serve.

Constitution and By-Laws Chair has provided copies of approved resolutions as approved at the MD 22 Convention.

Convention Chair MD-22 reported 630 persons attended convention. VDG "Buck" Fisher was elected Governor;" John Hopkins was elected VDG, both by majority vote. The 88th LCI Convention was also well attended. Efforts to increase attendance were not successful.

Diabetes Awareness Chair reported 7 Lions participated in "Kiss-A-Pig" contest with \$12,625 raised. With other donations, a grand total of \$41,927 was collected. 43 Clubs helped support these programs

Extension Chair Attended Meetings of MD-22 MERL Team and seminars At USA/Canada Forum.

Finance Chair reviewed the budget and found it to be in order.

Hearing and Speech Action Chair reported 6 clubs provided cash donations. Several programs have been presented primarily to promote Lions Affordable Hearing Aid Project (AHAP).

Historian reported Dist 22-W history for 2003-2004 was distributed. Updates for 04-05 and 05-06 will follow upon receipt of Final Reports. Thanks to Lion Perry Hamilton for allocating space in his storage unit for the filing of District 22-W History material and momentos.

Information Technology Chair reported Website was updated and functional.

International Relations Chair was a speaker at various clubs. Freedom District Lions twinned with Brighton Lions in England. Lions Day at the United Nations was held in March and Lions Worldwide Induction Day was in April. Clubs should avail themselves to other programs available.

Leader Dog Chair reported 100% participation of District 22-W Lions Clubs. Total contributions to "Leader Dogs For The Blind" totaled over \$18,000, an increase of over last year. The 4 rallies were attended by a total of over 400 persons.

Leadership Development Chair spoke to numerous clubs regarding leadership and associated problems. Training for club officers was held in 2 locations with very good attendance from 41 Clubs.

Lions Clubs International Chair reported that over \$50,000 was contributed to LCIF. District 22-Wadded 33 new Melvin Jones Fellows and 9 Progressive MJF's for a total of 598 Melvin Jones Fellows and 39 Progressive Fellows. All this since the founding of LCIF in 1973.

Lions Vision Research Foundation Chair headed up 2 successful banquets. LVRF is now short \$200,000 of the \$4 million goal. The educational program is moving toward completion.

Lioness Associate Coordinator reported we have 148 Lionesses serving in 3 clubs within District 22-W. These Clubs contributed over \$20,000 to Lions projects.

Membership Chair reported a net decrease in membership of -46 for a total of 1919.

Newsletter Editor published monthly bulletins and posted it on the District 22-W website.

Nominations Chair reported John Hopkins was the only nominee for District Governor and Barbara McKenney the only nominee for Vice District Governor. Both were voted into office at the MD 22 Convention.

Peace Poster Chair reported 394 entries from 14 clubs in District 22-W. The first place winner of 22-W did not win at the MD 22 Convention.

Pin Coordinator reported sales as follows; 134/150 (Bucks), 189/300 (22W) & 227/400 (MD22). The pins were on sale at the MD 22 Conv.

Pre-School Eye Screening Chair reported 42 Clubs participating in the PSVS program in Dist 22-W. There is work remaining to fully implement the program. A MD 22 Preschool Vision Screening Foundation has been approved for the purpose of developing funding for the program. Each Sub-District will now be represented on the PSVS Steering Committee and on the MD 22 PSVS Foundation board of trustees determining the future of this program.

Public Relations Chairs reported speaking at 2 Zone meetings and 1 Cabinet meeting. Goals would be to get each Club to appoint a Publicity Chair and to create a Club web site. We will assist ifrequested.

Research and Long Range Planning Chair noted they reviewed the Policy and Procedure Manual and presented changes to the voting Cabinet. The changes were approved.

Retention Chair reported that as part of the MERL team, all clubs have been encouraged to concentrate on retention and to make the club environment open to all.

Sight Conservation and White Cane Chair reported that a total of 116,860 pair of glasses and 4113 pair oflenses was shipped this year. 51 clubs participated in White Cane Day activities donating \$23,039 to the programs.

Social Director reported 134 persons attended the District 22-W Social with reciprocal guests. Proceeds from the program booklet of \$2,514 were donated to LVRF.

Song Leader says to keep on singing as only Lions, Lionesses and Leo's can do with very loud voices.

USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum Chair said that 15 persons were registered for the event and most attended the MD-22 breakfast.

Vehicle Tag Chair has received 11 applications this year. Hoping for more participants next year.

-women's Membership Development Chair reported presentations were made at District Cabinet and various Zone meetings plus at one Club meeting. Chair is in the process of gathering information for a series of articles for local publication being made available District wide.

Youth Outreach/LEO Clubs Chairs reported 41 Clubs participated in support of the "Suns" baseball game with a net profit of \$1,107. Region 1 was exploring the possibility of forming a Leo Club in the Jefferson/Brunswick Club area.

All committees were active as recapped in the following remarks. A more detailed report may be found in the Annual Report 2006-2007 Dist 22-W.

American Heritage and Patriotism Chairman PDG Dr. Cecil M Massie reported that there was participation from all four Regions within the District producing an essayist in each of the five categories.

Campaign Sight First II: \$165,325 was pledged by clubs in 22-W. This total also includes four Model Clubs - Freedom District, Potomac Valley, Sharpsburg and Taneytown.

Camp Merrick Chairman Susan K. Timmons advised that she along with others knowledgeable of the camp presented programs on the benefits and mission of Camp Merrick.

Constitution and By-Laws PDG Thomas J. Jefts: Changes to the Constitution and By-Laws of District 22-W were voted on at the convention in Dover, Delaware and passed.

Convention Chairman Richard C. Hosfeld - reported that 158 people from 22-W attended the MD 22 Convention. VDG Barbara J. McKenney was elected Governor and Susan Timmons was elected VDG, both by majority vote

Diabetes Awareness Chairman Donna S. Jackman reports that twenty-five clubs contributed \$6,314 to Camp Merrick. 13 children attended the camp. Region 4 Zone 3 donated \$2.090 to Diabetes Awareness from their annual Golf Tournament. Kiss-A-Pig contest netted \$10,250. Clubs contributed a total of \$37,250 to Diabetes Awareness.

Diabetes Walk Chairman Liz Eitemiller: 7 clubs represented by 49 walkers participated in Walk for Diabetes raising \$10,100. Overall walk netted \$210,242.

Disaster Alert Program Chairman PDG Thomas J. Jefts advised that a packet of information was mailed to each county coordinator along with a request that they contact the clubs in their area to obtain the name of a Club Chairman and have the information forwarded to him.

Extension Chairman PDG Andrew J. DeMario, Sr. reported that one new club (4-County Lions Club in Mount Airy) was chartered with 101 members. He is monitoring the progress of this club.

Hearing and Speech Action Chairman Brooks Widder states that District 22-W continues to collect used hearing aids. Four Lions clubs in the District have provided cash donations for the hearing and speech program. Programs on the Lions Affordable Hearing Aid Project (AHAP) were presented to several clubs. Currently there are hearing professionals in two Regions who are working to provide affordable hearing exams and aids to needy individuals.

Historian Chairman William H. Stonesifer reports that District 22-W History update for 2004-2005 and 2005-2006 were completed and distributed during March.

Leadership Development Chairman Terry A. Hosteler: Training for Presidents, Secretaries, and Treasurers for 2007-2008 year was held in two locations with 57 Lions in attendance. Training for Region and Zone Chairmen was held with 13 Lions in attendance;

Lioness Associate Coordinator Chairman Mary L. Stains-Ecker has overseen the activities of the 3 Lioness Clubs in 22-W with a total of 154 Lionesses.

Lions Clubs International Foundation Chairman PDG Marion D. Carmack, Jr.: District 22-W has 60 new Melvin Jones Fellowships, along with five Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows. The majority of the donations were designated for CSF II.

Lions Vision Research Foundation Chairman Robert L. Bullock reported that the two Lions Vision Research Banquets held this year in 22-W netted \$40,000 plus. The Lions and Low Vision Education Project was started.

Lions Quest Program Chairman Stephen D. Finger reported that he had enrolled in the new Lions Quest Chairman on-line training course, and had contacted all Region and Zone Chairmen to seek further information on any club's previous experience with Quest.

Membership Chairman Wayne L. Wiles: No report, but with all the clubs help and the addition of one new club, we ended the year with a plus 90 members.

Nominations Chairman PDG Carl H. Welsh: This year we had one candidate for District Governor, Lion Barbara J. McKenney and one candidate for Vice District Governor, Lion Susan K. Timmons. Each was duly elected at the Multiple District Convention.

Peace Poster Chairman Pauline E. "**Polly**" **Rosier:** reported entries from 9 clubs in District 22-W. The Dist 2nd p.lace winner was chosen as MD 22 winner.

Pin Coordinator Chairman Roy L. Davis: reported sales as follows; 236/300 (22-W) &251/300 (MD 22). The pins were on sale at the MD 22 convention. Net \$1,316.

Pre-School Eye Screening-Coordinator Chairman PDG Margarito "Och" Ochoa: Twelve Clubs participated in 93 Sessions, with 1050 children screened, of which 55 children were referred for follow-up.

Public Relations-Region I & II **Chairman PDG William L. Bulla** was instrumental is helping many clubs with their newspaper contacts. He published a Publicity Guide and made it available to the clubs.

Public Relations-Region III & **IV Chairman Lois Szymanski** held a publicity-training event on September 24, 2006 at McDaniel College in Westminster. She sent out over 40 press releases and personally wrote 14 Lion related articles.

USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum 2006 Chairman Richard E: pleased to announce that 22 W had 28 people in attendance. We were tied with 22 D, but we had 16 first timers and they all thought the forum was really worthwhile.

Vehicle Tag Chairman W. Roger Sauter: Lions Tags are very inexpensive, there is a onetime cost of only \$30.00. There are no additional annual or renewal fees for Lions Tags - you only need to pay your normal renewal fees. The "WHOSIT" directory book should be available in September.

Women's Membership Development Chairman Cartha Johnson advised that she put several articles about women in Lionism in newspapers and gave talks to clubs. District 22-W gained approximately 65 new women members in 2006-2007.

Youth Programs Chairman Barbara Ullrich: The "Suns "Baseball game did not have many Lions present this year. We netted \$785.

Use of the Welch Allen SureSight Optical Screener & the Random Dot Butterfly Test was increased. It allows for more objective screening and immediate results. LSKS is now tasked with funding the MD-22 PSVS Program in the future..
