DG Jeremy, GMT Lee Miller, and I would like to thank the Lions who attended the recent Zone and Region-wide meetings. At those meetings DG Jeremy's goals and action plan for membership growth in the district were shared and at each meeting Lions shared successful strategies for retaining members and growing our clubs. Lions International has created The Global Membership Approach as a four-step process that has been proven to increase both member satisfaction and new member recruitment, as well as new club chartering. The four steps are build a team, build a vision, build a plan and build success.

Build A Team: Build a team of club officers to help support the Global Membership Approach.

Build A Vision: Build a vision, assess needs and set goals.

Build A Plan: Build a plan to achieve our goals.

Build Success: Execute your plan, maintain accountability and adjust as needed.

This month let's consider building a vision, assessing needs, and setting goals to grow and retain club membership.

Goal: Rejuvenate our club with new members. Essential questions: What opportunities exist to expand membership? What do we need to do to better recruit members? Why are members not joining our club? Why do people join our club?

Goal: Re-motivate members with fellowship and exciting service. Essential questions: Are the club's service projects relevant to current community needs? Are members enthusiastic and actively involved in service projects? Is club leadership receptive to members' ideas for new service ideas? Do our service projects attract new members?

Goal: Excel in leadership development and club operations. Essential questions: Do club officers participate in training for their positions? Are members encouraged to take leadership positions? Do members regularly attend and participate in club functions? Do you need to reconsider the format of club meetings?

Goal: Share your club's achievements with your community. Essential questions: Is your club active on social media (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter)? Does your club have an e-Clubhouse or website? How are you keeping the public informed of your events? Do we include welcoming messages that encourage people to join?

Please consider asking these essential questions at your upcoming meetings. GMT Coordinator Lee Miller and our membership team would be happy to join you and assist in the process of developing a membership plan.

Lion-centered leadership is fairly simple: leadership that puts Lions first. Being Lion-centered shapes how we communicate with our club, our attitude, and the sense of trust we develop with our members. Lion-centered leadership makes success happen with Lions, not despite them.

Lion-centered leaders create nurturing environments that leave room for learning, understanding, and our needs as Lions. The three keys to Lion-centered leadership are:

- Empathy: Lion-centered leaders listen to others' perspectives, account for their own bias and advantages, and reflect on the life circumstances of their fellow Lions. * These leaders express care and concern and take tangible actions that improve the experience of all members of the
- club. These leaders understand when life gets in the way and that Lions do better when they are respected.
 Openness: Leaders who model openness create an environment of safety and mutual trust. Openness creates
- Openness: Leaders who model openness create an environment of safety and mutual trust. Openness creates
 relationships and encourages the best from our Lions. Leaders model openness when they admit when they're
 wrong, regularly seek response, and reflect on how their leadership actions impact the club. They choose
 influence over control and relationships over
 authoritarianism.
- Humility: Lion-centered leaders always believe there is more to learn and therefore value humility. They
 bring a growth mindset to their club, concentrating on growing more rather than on looking best or being right,
 They prioritize mentoring, coaching, and learning for themselves and their teams, and encourage collaboration
 and open-mindedness over competition and routine.

Leaders who put these principles into practice will find it much easier to sustain a Lion-centered culture in their club. The leaders of tomorrow will need to become more Lion-centered. Satisfying and addressing the needs of their valuable Lions is key for clubs that still want to be around after the next decade. Some ways to be more Lion-centered include:

- Recognize Lions as humans with needs.
- Examine all ideas for potential value, even when they sound off the wall to you.
- · Listen to all contributions, even when the value seems intangible to you.
- Guard against complacency.
- Advocate Lion learning.

Those clubs that are not centered on their Lions have been known to chase members away, to turn off potential new members, and to be a dying club. To change this, leadership has to evaluate where the club is and to conduct an assessment. The Club Quality Initiative is a strategic planning tool to help clubs identify opportunities for improvement. Change is critical for each club. By understanding our current operation, identifying areas that may be improved and taking measured steps to accomplish our goals, every club can be even better. ** For more information go to www.lionsclubs.org to secure DA CQI EN 5/21 or email questions to ClubQualityInitiatives@lionsclubs.org.

He is survived by his loving wife of 57 years, Faye Kave.


He graduated from Clarke County High School in 1961 and received a B.S. Degree from Tusculum College in Greenville, TN.

LOCAL LIONS DONATE TO ASSIST MAUL FIRE SURVIVORS

Lion Garrett Ogawa has been a friend of the Emmitsburg and Thurmont Lions Clubs for many years. He frequently attends classes at the Emergency Management Institute (EMI) in Emmitsburg, MD in his training to prepare for, mitigate against, respond to, and recover from disasters. Every time he comes to EMI, he always reaches out to the two local clubs for visits and information sharing. Lion Garrett's years of training, and taking those lessons back to the communities in Hawaii, came in handy after the terrifying wildfires in Maui abliterated the town designated as the Capital of the Hawaiian Islands in 1802 by King Kamehameha.

On Friday, August 25th, members of the local Lions Club met at Tuscany's Pizzeria for dinner and fellowship. Lion Garrett, who has served as Past District Governor of his District 50 Lions Club, and so deserves the title PDG, talked about the harrors of the wildfire and the impact it has had on the citizens of Maui, especially those in Lahaina. "The flames were traveling faster than one mile per minute (100 miles an hour) and they were impossible to outrun. Cars were exploding as the fire swept through the area. In fact, 25 police officers lost their own homes while they were responding to the fires."

Due to PDG Garrett's knowledge of emergency management and the specific needs of the survivors in Maui, he suggested that the clubs donate to the Hawaii Lions Foundation where local Lians can determine the best use of the funds. "Hawaii is receiving lots of donations, but it is important that people realize donations require a lot of effort to sort and use. Following any disaster, providing funds directly to non-profit organizations is the most useful for survivors' recovery." he said.

Emmitsburg Lions Club members Date Shields and Jim Hahn, who initiated the donation, said, "It looks like an atomic bomb was dropped. They are devastated. I hope our area never has to go through a disaster like these people are going through."

The Regional Lions Leadership Institute is designed for local Lions who have or wish to pursue leadership roles with their Lions providing service to their community. At the Institute you will learn about club operations, opportunities and resources available to clubs, and gain both valuable leadership skills and a deeper understanding of how to better serve your clubs.

The Institute is offered at the local level and organized by regional leaders from Maryland and Delaware. Lion eligible for the Institute must be in good standing and want to better support multiple district or district initiatives. They should not have attended an Institute within the last five (5) years.

The Institute engages participants in an interactive learning environment by conducting question and answer segments, facilitating meaningful discussions in large and small group settings, and facilitating group activities. At least half of the faculty in each classroom must be a Faculty Development Institute graduate or Lions Certified Instructor Program certified.

The Institute curriculum is designed to recognize the structure of the association. Utilize a variety of strategies to move a team to a level of high performance. Develop strategies to effectively overcome the challenges of diversity in our clubs and districts, implement techniques of effective speech delivery, identify strategies for achieving effective time management. Complete a draft of a personal mission statement. Create an action plan for motivating Lions club members. Set and prioritize goals.

District 22-W provides scholarships to cover part of the cost of this training.



Eligible birth dates are November 16, 2009, through November 15, 2012. Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches. Artwork may not be matted or framed. Only one entry per student per year, and each entry must be the work of only one student. All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted. All media are accepted. Chalk, charcoal, and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries. Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled, or attached to the artwork in any way. The use of lettering, numbering, or writing an the front of the paster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster along with full name, age, birth date, school name, grade, and phone number. Artwork should be done on a flexible material so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold the poster. Posters not meeting these specifications will be disqualified.

The South Carroll Lioness Lians Club is spansoring this contest for all middle school students in the Eldersburg, Sybesville community whether they attend public, private, parochial, or home schools as long as they will be 11, 12 or 13 by November 15, 2023. Contestants are invited to create a poster that visually communicates the contest's theme, "Dare to Dream," following all the guidelines listed above.

Peace Poster kits can be picked up at the Eldersburg Library between September 25 and October 23. On October 14 from 1-2 p.m. kids will have an opportunity to create their posters at the library.
