CADILLAC TIME - DEVELOPING A LEADERSHIP STYLE NOVEMBER 2023

As a Lion you currently have and will continue to have leadership opportunities. Determining your leadership style is important, but the style you choose is not final. As we experience life as humans and as Lions we observe those who are our leaders or those we would want to lead us. From them we learn different styles of leadership.

Our first leaders are our parents, our relatives, our neighbors, our teachers. Later we learn different styles of leadership from employers, friends, elected officials, community organizers and other mentors. We learn what we like of their style and are willing to incorporate it into our own style. We learn what we do not like and are not willing to emulate.

In her novel Breathless, Amy McCullock has a character say, "If I am not learning. I am not improving. And if I am not getting better then what is the point." As we progress in our leadership journey we are aways learning, developing, evaluating, and adjusting.

One leader I learned from was the owner of a growing company who realized that mentoring future leaders was the best way to build a team. Having flown around the world many times, he no longer liked to fly. He drove to the various site locations to meet with customers, check on projects, and to stay informed about his business. First he favored a Buick for these drives, later a Cadillac, and finally a Mercedes. Because he drove he would bring other managers along. No matter the car, we called it "Cadillac time." During the hours or even days on the road he would ask questions and provide his 'isms," his ideas, as a mentor. He would talk about how he handled issues, managed people, and made decisions.

Cadillac time was a period for teaching and learning. Sometimes it was spent with introspection and constructive review of how our actions or inactions affected what we did. It was not always pleasant, but it was informative. He was the mentor and expected his managers to listen to what he had to say; but he expected them to think for themselves, be able to make decisions, and to explain the reason for those decisions. Sometimes he even spoke about his decisions that did not work as planned.

Choose you own mentors. Continue learning and improving. Figure out your own version of Cadillac time with your own mentors. Continue getting better as a leader. We all attain leadership styles from others. Choose wisely, learn from the missteps. Listen to your mentors, watch and learn, but always make up your own mind.

WILLIAM FREDERICK MUNCK OCTOBER 23, 1949-SEPTEMBER 27, 2023

William (Bill) Frederick Munck, 73, of Frostburg, Maryland passed away on September 27, 2023, at the UPMC Western Maryland Hospital Center in Cumberland, Maryland. He was the son of the late Gertrude and Carlton Munck. In addition to his parents, he was also preceded in death by a sister, Patricia McCumber, and a brother, Carlton Munck.

Bill worked as a Rehabilitation Services Food Supervisor in both West Virginia and Kansas. He retired from the position in Kansas and moved to Frostburg with his wife Susan.

Bill was a former town councilman and mayor of the town of Valley Falls, Kansas. Upon his return to Frostburg, he became very active in the Frostburg Lions Club serving as president for many years. He was the winner of several Lions Club awards, the most notable being the Melvin Jones Award, the organization's highest honor named for the founder of Lions International. He and his wife, Susan, also a Lion member, co-founded the Summer Lunch Box Program which fed meals to children in the Frostburg area during summer time. This Lions Club program was recognized and publicized by Lions Club International for its outstanding service to the community.

Bill was an active member of the First Presbyterian Church of Frostburg. He participated in many activities of the Church including several mission trips to a South Dakota Indian reservation.

Bill received great enjoyment in helping people whether through Lions Club projects or those of the Church. He was totally dedicated to serving others, a testament to the Lions Club motto, "We Serve."

He is survived by his loving wife of 39 years, Susan Taylor Baker Munck. He is also survived by a nephew, Jason McCumber (Jana), nieces Kara Enos (Randy), Kelli Smith, and Jamie Holbert (Jason). Also surviving are three children from a previous marriage, Katrina Munck, Jeffrey Munck, and William Munck Maguire.

A memorial service will be held at the First Presbyterian Church in Frostburg at 1:00 p.m. on October 14, 2023 with the Rev. Stan Howes officiating. THOMAS BROOKS MCBURNEY JULY 6, 1947 - SEPTEMBER 29, 2023

Thomas Brooks McBurney, age 76, of Hagerstown peacefully passed away on Friday, September 29, 2023, at home after a two year courageous battle with Pancreatic Cancer.

He was born in Oakland, California on July 6, 1947, the son of the late John and Patricia McBurney. He was the loving husband of Margaret Blick McBurney, his wife of 52 years.

He is survived by his children, Doug (Lindsay) McBurney and Megan (Jared) Roberts, his brother, Michael (Marsha) McBurney, sister-in-law Robyn McBurney and four beautiful grandchildren - Harrison, Audrey, Ella, and Blake. He is preceded in death by his brother, Kevin McBurney.

Growing up his father was an aircraft tool design engineer for the U.S. Navy, which explained Brooks' lifelong love of aircrafts. He attended Catholic School (taught by strict nuns) and in his free time, he earned his Eagle Badge and was a paper boy for the Oakland Tribune. He attended California State College earning a Bachelor's Degree in Economics and later completed his Master's Degree at the University of Wisconsin.

Brooks' professional career involved personnel work in a variety of industries including printing, publishing, light manufacturing and insurance. In 1983, he joined Mt. Sinai Hospital, working in their HR department. After 19 Wisconsin winters, an exciting new opportunity presented itself in Hagerstown, Maryland. In 1988, he joined Washington County Hospital as the Vice President of Human Resources where he worked for the next 20 years.

Retirement allowed Brooks the opportunity to become further involved in numerous organizations in his community. He served as the President of The Maryland Healthcare and Human Resources Association. Brooks volunteered on numerous boards including CASA, YMCA, St. Ann's Pastoral Counsel, The Gaming Commission, and Goretti Catholic High School. One of his proudest achievements was starting a book recycling program through the Hagerstown Lions Club. He also spent time volunteering at Paramount Elementary School as a reading tutor in second grade.

He had a passion for traveling with friends, photography, reading history books, biking, swimming, and spending time at his beloved Yosemite National Park. Brooks shared a love for Raider's Football with his son and enjoyed cheering for University of Wisconsin with his wife. His children and grandchildren brought him immense pride and were his greatest blessings in life.

A visitation for family and friends will be held at Douglas A. Fiery Funeral Home 1331 Eastern Blvd. North, Hagerstown, MD on Wednesday, October 4th from 5-8pm. The funeral service will be at St. Ann's Catholic Church on Thursday, October 5th at 10am.



The Vice District Governor Challenge Between the 2nd and 3rd Cabinet Meeting

The Vice District Governor's challenge will begin on November 12, 2023, for completion by January 13, 2024. We are hosting a food drive for the five food pantries serving Carroll Community College, Frederick Community College, Hagerstown Community College, Allegany College of Maryland, and Garrett College.



For fiscal year 2024 the Maryland Food Bank began charging colleges 50% of the cost for all food ordered and the food pantry has not been funded by the various colleges. All of the food pantries have been struggling to find grants and other sources to keep their pantries stocked with current food items. The challenge is for our Lions to provide non-perishable food items such as canned goods, boxed goods, breakfast items, grab and go meals, snacks and drinks, etc., hygiene products like feminine products, deodorants, body wash, toothpastes and toothbrushes, cleaning supplies, baby supplies, diapers, and paper products (toilet paper, paper towels, etc.). Some clubs may wish to make monetary donations to their food pantry.

IS ARIC GEN2 FOR YOU?

Participants will be adults aged 50 to 80 years of age with a diagnosis of type 2 diabetes. If you have type 2 diabetes, you are potentially eligible to participate in our study.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN?

Participants will be asked to come to the ARIC Field Center to collect some information and we will also study your glucose and heart rhythm for 2 weeks following the clinic visit. 
Christmas Ornament (Contributed by Lion Albie Little)


